OGDEN WOMEN ARE DELEGATES

Governor Bamberger Selects Representatives to Woman's Farm Congress

Among the list of Utah women, named yesterday by Governor Bamberger as delegates to the Farm Women's National Congress, to be held in Salt Lake City, Utah, on Saturday of this week, Miss Ellen Agren and Mrs. E. A. Barnes of Ogden, and Mrs. Pearl Chadwick of North Ogden, are the only Ogden and Weber county women selected as delegates.

The conference called by Mrs. Fannie M. Kitch, of Clarksville, Iowa, president, and Mrs. Faye M. Holt of Havelock, Iowa, secretary.

One of the big problems which will come before the convention is getting county and city women together and thus facilitate both food production and food marketing.

The object, as stated in the call, are three fold:

"The study and discussion of all problems affecting the healthfulness and attractiveness of farm home life, assisting women and giving them greater independence, thus lessening the tendency for the girls to seek employment in the cities; and the study of problems affecting community welfare and the conduct of public affairs, all of which directly and vitally concern the home."

The congress is expected to have great value socially as well as educationally. "The meeting and becoming acquainted with delegates from every state in the union has a broadening influence which cannot be estimated," those calling it declare.

Landing at Ellis Island, New York, last week she was detained by immigration authorities and ordered to be returned to England on the same ship.

When Mr. Powell heard of the orders he immediately appealed to Senator Smoot, who wired immediately to Washington.
