UTAH ELEVENS HAVE BUSY WEEK

Crimson Clashes With California at Berkeley While Aggies Vie With Montana

The present week will be a busy one for the University of Utah and Utah Aggie gridiron stars. Last week the crimson met defeat at Colorado Springs in the final period of play, the score being 29 to 3 in favor of the Tigers. This week the state institution clashes with one of the strongest and flashiest elevens on the west coast in California.

The California aggregation has rolled up some heavy scores thus far this season and are out to repeat when the game starts on the Berkeley field next Saturday. To date they have accomplished the following: California 26, San Francisco Olympic club 0; California 15, Mare Island Marines 9; California 17, St. Mary's 9; California 19, Nevada 7.

Brick Muller, Larry Deeds and "Pesty" Sprout, three former stars of the San Diego high school eleven, are the big stars on the Blue and Gold aggregation this season. "Cort" Majors, a Los Angeles star, is captain of the eleven.

The Californians have adopted a unique style of play this season resorting to hitting the line, forward passes and open field work being seldom used. At least that is what coast critics say in regard to the team's work.

With Moose Stiefel back in the tugs during the present week, the "U" stars should take on added pep. Stiefel was out of the contest at Colorado Springs last week due to injuries but will be in the fray this week when the whistle sounds at Berkeley. Moose is a backfield star and one of the best in the entire country.

The "U" aggregation passed through Ogden last night en route to Salt Lake, one the worse after the hard struggle in Colorado. Coach Fitzpatrick stated that the breaks were against the crimson in the last period, the playing of McTavish being the cause of the Utah defeat. Utah will depart for the coast Wednesday.

While the Utah aggregation is doing battle on the coast next Saturday, the Aggie stars will clash with the fast Montana State aggregation at Bozeman. Coach Romney's aggregation showed their colors last Saturday when they completely trounced the Colorado School of Mines aggregation 27 to 3 in a flashy game. Falck, Dorius, Hansen, Hart and Anderson together with Captain Weller were the mainstays in the Aggie attack.

The Aggies will depart next Thursday for the north, primed to trim the Montana aggregation, which is regarded as one of the best teams in the northwest conference.

TIGERS TO VIE WITH LEOPARDS

Peterson's Aggregation to Meet Fastest Team in State at Salt Lake Friday

What gives promise of being the hardest game of the season for the Ogden Tigers will be staged at Salt Lake next Friday afternoon when the locals vie with the East High school aggregation on the gridiron. Thus far this season the Leopards have completely smothered every aggregation which they have met and are out to hand the Tigers a severe trimming. Last season the Leopards won from the Tigers on the local field by a 7 to 0 score, the Tigers being more effective against the state title holders than any other aggregation during the season.

Coach Romney has practically the same aggregation in harness this season that represented the Leopards last year. In Smith and Parkinson he has two all-state ends of the 1919 season and two men who are speed balls of the first order. These men have showed a world of class against the opposition during the present season.

In the backfield Captain Henderson, Livingston, Roberts, Jewkes and Kemp are showing to good advantage. Two of these men—Henderson and Livingston were all-state selections last season. They are expected to be the bright stars against the locals next Friday.

The Tigers will be worked harder than ever this week according to Coach Peterson in an effort to send the Leopards back to their fair defeat. Old graduates are expected to lend a hand this week and aid the mentor in perfecting his eleven.

Captain Ellison Skene, who was injured in scrimmage last week, will be back in tugs this week and is expected to show a world of class in the east High school game. Skene is one of the best backs in the state and is showing in the coming contest will go a large way toward his winning a place on the all-state selection.

Peterson and Norton showed to good advantage in the contest last Saturday against the Utah Freshmen and should develop into first rate stars. Norton, while a midget in size, played a wonderful game against his heavier opponents and was responsible for the touchdown registered by the Tigers. He will in all probability be used at end Friday.

Falck started at tackle in the Saturday matinee. He showed class and gave promise of landing a tackle position on the all-state team. He is a polished player and if his future games are played with the same class and pep as the ones in the past have been played, he will be a cinch for all-state honors.

A social train carrying Ogden High school rosters will leave here next Friday determined to return with the victory well in hand. The contest at Salt Lake will start at 3 o'clock.

INTEREST KEEN IN "BIG" TEN

Four Aggregations Tied for First Honors; Real Test to Come Saturday

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—Football results in the western conference yesterday left four teams undefeated thus far this season and practically assured elimination of Minnesota and Purdue from the race for the big ten championship. Wisconsin, Illinois and Ohio State won conference games, giving each a standing of one game won and none lost, while Chicago, which played Washburn, an outside eleven, already had a mark of one victory and no defeat.


