HONOR OGDEN BOYS IN ST. JOHN'S MEMORIAL

Names of Eight Ogden Young Men to Be Placed on Bronze Tablet

DELAFIELD, Wis., Nov. 6.—In the presence of a notable gathering to include Governor E. L. Phillips of Wisconsin, Governor Frank O. Lowden of Illinois, Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood and staff, Lieut. Col. Louis Rossignol representing the French High Commission, 300 members of the St. John's Military academy alumni association from all parts of the country in service uniform and the cadet corps, President Sidney T. Smythe will lay the corner stone here Nov. 14, National Armistice day, to be erected in honor of more than 700 St. John's graduates and former students who served in the World War. Gen. Wood will deliver the address of the day.

The chapel will be of Waukesha limestone, 160x80 feet, and built in lines of Gothic architecture to harmonize with the present academy group. It is planned to give over one entire wall of the interior to a huge bronze memorial tablet of individual names, those who died in service to be designated by gold stars. Funds for the project are being raised in a nationwide subscription fund under direction of the St. John's Victory Memorial corporation. The corporation is a separate organization from the academy thus guaranteeing the perpetuity of the edifice. An endowment fund has been pledged for maintenance.

ABE MAJORS MAKES REQUEST FOR PARDON

SALT LAKE, Nov. 6.—Abe Majors is applying for pardon to the state board of pardons and Joe Backlash and Frank De Pello for commutation of sentence. Each of the applicants was sentenced for murder.

For parole—Rolly Kay, attempt to commit second degree burglary; Dan McCarty, burglary; and Herbert Middleton, burglary.

COUNTRY EDITORS TO MEET AT LOGAN MONDAY

SALT LAKE, Nov. 6.—The fall convention of the Utah Press association will open at Logan Monday morning. Important matters connected with the legislative program to be adopted by the association will be brought up for consideration. Prize cups will be given by the Utah Agricultural college for excellence and service, to the best paper in the state.

The first prize will be given the paper that best serves the interest of the community "by its varied news, vital editorials, well selected advertisements—in short, by its general comprehension and news value."

The second prize will be given for technical excellence in the makeup of the first page.

AFFAIRS OF SUGAR CO. CONTINUE UNDER FIRE

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 6.—With George E. Sanders, former president and promoter of the company on the witness stand, the affairs of the Oregon-Idaho Sugar company continued under fire this morning in the federal trade-sugar commission's sugar probe.

A feature of the hearing was frequent arguments on technical points between counsel for the sugar company and the commission which took up considerable time. It was finally pointed out by Examiner J. J. Dunham, who is hearing the case, that the federal commission had prohibited such argument during the taking of testimony are requested that the rule be observed by both attorneys.

ORE PRODUCTION AT PARK CITY INCREASES

PARK CITY, Nov. 6.—Ore production in Park City district increased during the past week to a total of 184 tons, as compared with 154 tons of the preceding week. Improved labor conditions are largely responsible for the increase, it is stated.

EARLY LOGAN BUILDER DIES AT AGE OF 80

LOGAN, Nov. 6.—John R. Blanchard, 80 years of age, one of the original band of pioneers of this city, died at noon yesterday after a short illness in spite of his advanced age. Mr. Blanchard had been active until a few months ago. He was well known in this district having conducted a hotel here for many years, the old Logan house. He helped to erect the first dwelling house in this city. Surviving are his wife and several children.

MAKE UNSUCCESSFUL ATTEMPT TO CRACK SAFE

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 6.—An unsuccessful attempt to open a safe in the Howard cafe, at West Third South street, Friday night by burglars who are thought to have been frightened away before they had time to complete their work. The safe had been rolled to the rear of the place where it was found this morning.

CITY WELL IS OPENED

POCATELLO, Ida., Nov. 6.—Contractor J. M. Beardsen returned yesterday from Ashton, where he inspected the final installation of the motor for the well in the new city water system. Mr. Beardsen had the contract for the system and the pipe has been laid for several days, with the exception of some of the lateral lines. Considerable difficulty has been met by the contractor in obtaining labor for some of the work.
