This party will inspect every variety of tree in this vicinity.

Friday evening at the State Industrial school, C. W. Wimmer, scoutmaster of troops 7 and 19, will be awarded a "veteran scout" badge, by Commissioner W. G. King.

Wimmer has been in constant service in Ogden for the past five years and is one of two men in the state to receive such an honor. The pin is awarded by the national council of boy scouts.

Scout Executive G. A. Goates will have charge of the scout leaders' school and will be assisted by Hugh Holdaway and other scoutmasters of the city.

Cruise of Fleets Attracts Recruits

Attracted by the forthcoming cruise of the Atlantic and Pacific fleets to southern waters, which is scheduled to start about March 1, recruiting at the Ogden naval station is showing a decided increase. Nine men were sent out this morning. Reports received here show that the western division is accepting 300 men weekly and the nation as a whole 2400 men weekly.
