

OGDEN ARSENAL BUILDER HERE

W. H. Sutherland Returns From Washington: Work To Be Pushed Rapidly

Construction of the buildings at the Ogden arsenal will be pushed to completion, according to W. H. Sutherland, of the W. H. Sutherland Contracting company of St. Louis, who arrived in Ogden yesterday from Washington, D. C., to inspect the work thus far accomplished by his firm at the Ogden arsenal.

Work on more than seven buildings at the site has been completed while the brick work on the other buildings is rising rapidly, according to Mr. Sutherland.

The walls in the magazine buildings are being placed in position and these buildings are expected to be ready for use within the next four weeks. The administration building, the largest building on the site, will be completed and ready for use during the next two weeks, he said.

Additional ground for the arsenal may be purchased for other buildings, which may be used for ordnance storage. Representatives of the ordnance department recently inspected the site and are expected to pass upon the proposed buildings.

The spur tracks constructed by Taylor and Child of Ogden are now in use to transport the materials from the Bamberger tracks to various places on the site.
