STOCKMEN TO GATHER IN S. L.

Three Associations to Hold Conventions Starting December 6

SALT LAKE, Nov. 29.—Three conventions to be held in Salt Lake, December 6, 7 and 8, are attracting a great amount of interest from stockmen in all parts of Utah. The dates were originally fixed by the California Cattlemen's association, which called a convention of about forty livestock associations in twelve western states, to consider problems believed to have utmost importance to the livestock industry in the west at present.

The California association called for a conference of the officers and representatives of the interested associations. However, the time was deemed opportune by the Utah Cattle and Horse Growers' association for the holding of its annual convention, which is open to all the livestock men of the state, whether the various stockmen's organizations to which they may belong have actually taken out membership in the state association or not.

The United Stockmen's Association for Federal Control of Public Grazing Lands, of which Charles P. Mullen of Skull Valley, Arizona, is president, and Les Dillingham of Meeker, Idaho, is secretary, also issued a call for a convention of range livestock producers, to be held at the Hotel Utah on the same dates as the conference of livestock officials—or "longer if necessary."

"The United association," says the call for that convention, in discussing scope and aims, "desires not only the attendance of the officers of stock associations, but that of as many producers as possible."

"The first day of the convention will be given over to the consideration by the officers of state and local livestock associations of the many questions raised by the California Cattlemen's association, and the results of this conference will be reported to the general convention the following two days, at which time other matters will be presented for collective consideration."

QUARTER MILLION PAID TO RUPERT BEET MEN

RUPERT, Idaho, Nov. 28.—The Amalgamated Sugar company has paid approximately \$250,000 to date for beets delivered by north-side farmers to the sugar factory at Paul. This is only a part of the full amount. The remainder will be paid later in the season. The monthly payroll at the factory is about \$19,000. Three eight-hour shifts are working. The factory will run 25 days longer this year, making a total run of about 75 days. It is said that nearly 5000 tons of beets have yet to be delivered. At present north-side farmers have received about \$80,000 more than last year, due to higher prices and increased yields.

GRAIN DESTROYED BY FIRE NEAR POCATELLO

POCATELLO, Idaho, Nov. 28.—Information has reached Pocatello of the loss by Linderman Brothers of more than \$4000 worth of machinery and grain by fire Thursday. The fire started from the back-fire of a caterpillar tractor on the farm near Dummond. The caterpillar caught fire and the flames spread to other machinery until a truck, a harvester and some grain were destroyed. There is a slight amount of insurance on some of the machinery.

NAME TWO FOR SCHOOL ELECTION IN SALT LAKE

SALT LAKE, Nov. 29.—A. L. Larson of the fifth municipal ward has been entered as a candidate for the board of education. A. J. Brunson has been entered as a candidate from the first ward. The names of the men together with those of other candidates will be voted upon at the election Wednesday.

IDAHO TEACHERS CLOSE CONVENTION AT BOISE

BOISE, Idaho, Nov. 29.—With nominations of officers and recommendations to the legislature, the Idaho State Teachers' association closed its convention here yesterday. Reports of all standing committees, showing the association to be in excellent condition, were adopted.

The nominations follow: For president, C. F. Bishop, principal of Boise high school; C. R. Pradip, superintendent of the Idaho Technical Institute, and Mrs. Laura Butz, superintendent of schools, Wardner-Kellogg; for vice president, Mrs. Elizabeth L. Swain, dean of women at the Idaho State Normal, and W. R. Oldham, county superintendent of Madison county; for secretary, F. E. Lukins, superintendent of schools, Grandview, and Mrs. Alice Beach, Montpelier; for treasurer, James A. Langston, superintendent of schools, Shelley; and E. H. Buck, superintendent of schools, Halley.

The teachers have until February 25 to ballot on the nomination. The committee on legislation made a large number of recommendations, which were adopted. They include state-wide tax for public education, raising the bond limit for class A school districts, raising the salaries of county superintendents of schools; urging the appointment of high school superintendents; establishment of a board for the education of feeble-minded children; support for rural high schools; appointment of a state health supervisor; a school district consolidation act.

SALT LAKE YOUTH IS SHOT IN SHOULDER

SALT LAKE, Nov. 28.—Edwin Almstedt, 17 years old, 1450 Van Buren avenue was shot through the shoulder yesterday by Wesley Hobbs, 16 years of age, according to a report from the police. Almstedt was taken to the emergency hospital and was allowed to go to his home when the bullet wound was found to be of a slight nature.

The shooting, it is stated, occurred near Saltair. A number of boys were shooting. It is stated when Almstedt drove past in a car, Hobbs is said to have fired a shot through the rear window of the auto.

IDAHO FARMERS GET GOOD BARLEY YIELD

RUPERT, Idaho, Nov. 29.—Threshing of 100 bushels of Trebi barley at the ranch of R. P. Coon, near Paul, has been reported recently. The yield which ran uniformly by the threshing of barley from a four acre field, is exceptionally heavy.

Jeane Matthews, a neighbor of Mr. Coon, threshed 107 bushels of the same variety of barley for each acre of a field slightly smaller than that of Mr. Coon's.

PIONEER RESIDENT OF UTAH DIES AT SALT LAKE

SALT LAKE, Nov. 28.—Bishop James C. Hamilton, of the Mill Creek ward, died yesterday morning at his home, 2240 Seventh East street. He was born in Warwick, Canada, January 10, 1846, the son of James L. and Mary Ann Campbell Hamilton.

In 1848 he went to Nauvoo with his parents and as an infant crossed the plains with his parents as far as Omaha, Neb. The Hamilton family later came to Utah and located at Mill Creek. Bishop Hamilton has been a resident of Mill Creek practically all of his life and for the past twenty-four years has been bishop of the Mill Creek ward.

PLANTS LARGE TROUT IN ZION CANYON CREEK

SALT LAKE, Nov. 29.—Falter Rush, acting superintendent of Zion National Park, advised R. H. Siddoway, state fish and game commissioner that he has planted 122 large trout in Zion canyon streams. The fish were taken from other streams in Washington county, it is stated.

Mr. Siddoway reports that consent has been given for the taking of white fish eggs from Bear Lake by parties connected with the federal fish hatchery at Springville. Two parties will engage in this work, each taking a different section of the lake. Last season, some 5,000,000 eggs of white fish were taken from Bear Lake. Some were planted in the fry stage in Utah Lake, while others were returned to Bear Lake.

FALLS FROM TREE, BREAKS THREE RIBS

RUPERT, Idaho, Nov. 29.—Climbing in a tree after turkeys which had roosted there, W. M. Dawley fell from a limb and broke three ribs. Mr. Dawley lives six miles south of Rupert.

JAPAN SMELTS IRON FROM VOLCANIC SANDS

TOKYO, Nov. 14.—(Correspondence)—A method whereby iron may be smelted from volcanic iron oxide sand, heretofore regarded as wholly refractory, has been discovered by scientific experimenters working for the war department. While the discovery cannot be employed as yet commercially, the cost of the iron so obtained being found to compete with iron smelted from ore, the value of the process to Japan from a military standpoint, is said to be great, inasmuch as it places this country in an independent position so far as its supply of steel for military and naval use is concerned.

Japan, like every other volcanic country, is rich in deposits of iron oxide. A statement of the war office yesterday says: "The recurrent anti-Japanese movements in different parts of the Chinese republic that have been pronounced since the peace conference at Paris, demand of the Japanese government every effort for the discovery of some means to ensure steel supply adequate enough for domestic consumption, in anticipation of a possible future suspension of iron imports. The experiments of a year have now been completed with tolerable success. They have so far been made chiefly with the military necessity in view and also with the object of making up the existing shortage of iron supplies. The process discovered, therefore, does not necessarily insure economic advantages, while the success is limited to that stage of producing iron sand blocks which may with advantage be blended with the ordinary pig-iron in producing steel."

HAS SOMETHING STRONGER THAN HOOR IN HIS CELLAR

ORANGES COMING EAST

VISALIA, Cal., Nov. 27.—Shipment of Washington navel oranges will be in full force in Tulare county within a few days. Tests, carried on at the Lindsay testing station, show the fruit to be up to the sight to one cent more than the average of the year.

The oranges this year apparently will be of better quality than last year, and the crop in this county is estimated at 25 per cent over that of last year.
