

### INAUGURATION TRIP PROPOSED

#### Special Train of Utahns May Make Trip to Washington

Clubs and organizations in Weber county that have an interest in the promotion of Utah's industrial and agricultural activities will be asked to give their co-operation to a committee in Salt Lake in an effort to secure a sufficient number of public-spirited men and women to make up a special train for the purpose of attending the inauguration of Warren G. Harding at Washington, March 4.

The committee is comprised of former Governor William Spry, Harry S. Joseph, mining engineer, and Lamar Nelson, secretary to Governor-elect Charles R. Mabey.

Although the idea originates with men prominent in the recent Republican victory at the polls, it is being put forth absolutely as a nonpartisan move.

Patriotism and a desire to place the state of Utah in the position they feel it should occupy in the eyes of the east is the inspiration for the plan, it was said yesterday. The plan, while only in its infancy, is expected to grow if the co-operation of those organizations toward a goal they seek—development of Utah—is secured.

It is hoped that a delegation of at least 150 persons will attend the inauguration of the president-elect, pay their compliments to Mr. Harding, secure a prominent place in the inaugural parade and be in the front line when Mr. Harding takes the oath of office.

Among the many suggestions for such a trip are provisions for a special train. This would require a minimum of 150 persons and arrangements could be made to have the train so routed that the principal industrial sections of the United States would be visited en route and the opportunity given to properly place Utah's industrial and agricultural opportunities before the investment public.

In Washington it is planned to have Francis G. Matson, who had charge of the national end of the recent Republican campaign in Utah, to make arrangements for having the Utah delegation secure prominent seats and provide housing and insure their reception by the president-elect.

It is estimated that the maximum cost of the trip would be \$500, and the public spirit of the business men and organizations of the state is expected to assist in making a success of the proposed trip.

The railroads have promised co-operation in the matter of a special train and special routing. No contributions are being sought, it was explained yesterday, but the public-spirited business men and women are to be solicited to help in making such a trip not only possible, but a success.

### FARM PROBLEM VEXES HOUSTON

#### Treasury Head Offers No Quick Remedy for Decline in Farm Prices

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Treasury officials have given more thought to the situation the farmers face as a result of the falling prices of their products than they have to any other question, but they have arrived at no solution of the problem, Secretary Houston declared today before a joint senate and house agriculture committee.

### SECRETARY IN DOUBT

The treasury secretary declared that he knew of no feasible means the treasury could adopt to furnish relief that might not bring about worse conditions than now obtaining.

Houston said he had "grave doubts" that a revival of the war-finance corporation would help.

### TAX ON GRAIN FUTURES

Two measures looking to the relief of farmers have been drafted by Representative Dickinson, Republican, of Iowa, who announced today that they would be offered immediately after congress convenes on Monday.

One is a bill imposing a tax of ten per cent on the total value of all contracts for the sale of grain when delivery is not made within thirty days and the other is a resolution authorizing the appointment of a special committee to investigate grain, livestock and cotton prices and recommend legislation designed to remedy present conditions.

Mr. Dickinson declared that levy of a tax on futures contracts would check speculation, bring about greater exchanges and would stabilize prices.

### PROHIBIT RUM IN PLUM PUDDING

Alcoholic Flavor in Home-Made Holiday Dishes Forbidden By Order

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—The flavoring of home-made Christmas plum pudding, mince meal and brandied cherries and peaches with alcoholic spirits is in violation of the prohibition enforcement law and such foods are liable to seizure, it was stated today at the bureau of internal revenue.

Officials explained that under their interpretation of the enforcement act culinary products in which alcohol is an ingredient can be made only by manufacturers of food products who obtain a permit from the government and that such products must contain less than one-half of one per cent of alcohol.

Officials also said that the regulations require that such products shall not be used or sold on the premises and that this effectively barred the housewife from making foods with liquor in them.

### Mrs. Warburton Under Suspension at S. F.

Mrs. Glad K. Warburton of Salt Lake, in charge of prohibition enforcement in San Francisco, and who a few months ago created a stir when she started for Washington apparently with the idea of reporting certain discrepancies which were alleged to have taken place in the San Francisco office, but turned back at Ogden, and resumed her position, is now under suspension, according to Washington dispatches, although still nominally in the service.

She has been indicted at San Francisco for conspiracy in the liquor conspiracy recently uncovered there, it was said.

Within a few days, however, she will be dismissed, not alone because of the charges contained in the indictment, but because an independent investigation conducted by the internal revenue bureau disclosed that her conduct at San Francisco and her associations with men implicated in liquor manipulations of the bay city destroyed her usefulness in the prohibition service.

Washington officials have been loth to give credence to the charges brought against Mrs. Warburton, but their own investigations and her unsatisfactory reply to the formal charges that were brought against her have left an alternative but to compel her retirement from public service. Even now, following the action of the grand jury at San Francisco the internal revenue bureau declines to make public any facts in Mrs. Warburton's case.

### BRAZIL STOPS IMPORTS OF AMERICAN LEATHER

RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 3.—Importation of leather from the United States will be discontinued until the American dollar approximates the normal exchange rate, according to a resolution adopted by the Association of Boot and Shoe Manufacturers here.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—State department officials said today that a misconception had been placed upon their statement of yesterday as to whether President Wilson would act officially or personally in naming a mediator to act for him in an effort to settle the trouble between the Armenians and Turkish Nationalists.

They said the president would act personally and not officially in appointing a mediator, but they pointed out it would be difficult, of course, to differentiate between Woodrow Wilson personally and president of the United States, should the negotiations be not concluded before President

### S. P. to Produce Film for Employees

### Electricity Sleuth After Errant Currents

Armed with a millivolt meter, an employe of the Bamberger Railway company is making a survey of the tracks of the electric railway along Lincoln avenue.

Leakage of electricity from bonds between the rails is the reason for the survey, it is stated, the electricity thus released causing damage not only to Bamberger cars but to the water pipes laying beneath the pavement.

The bonds which are being examined are lengths of heavy copper wire,

welded to the extremities of the rails so that the entire track will be a conductor of electricity. Continual shaking and jarring of these bonds has loosened some, it is stated, and as the result a large amount of electricity is allowed to escape. If it "grounds" through the electric pipes, electrolysis takes place and the pipes are eventually destroyed.

The "wild" electricity also causes damages to the electric cars, causing various electrical equipment to burn

because of a surplus current. Following the survey of the tracks, steps will be taken to replace bonds which are not functioning properly.
