UTAH SCHOOLS GET 10 MILLION DIPPING ORDER BRINGS CLASH

Assistant Superintendent for State Files Report for 1919-20

SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—Nearly 100 million dollars was received by school districts of the state during school year of 1919-20, this sum including money borrowed on bonds and temporary notes.

Data prepared by E. J. Norton, assistant state superintendent of public instruction, for biennial report of his office, shows that the exact sum received by the school districts for the year was \$98,511,941.18. Bonds and loans in the latter school year totaled \$3,412,776.14, while for the preceding school year they were \$4,934,577. It is explained, however, that of the increased \$2,000,000 represented the net from this source in the Salt Lake City school district alone. Increase in costs of building activity after the war-time restrictions were removed account at least in part for the unusual borrowing by school districts during the last school year.

From the state district school fund the schools received \$1,686,004.26 in the last school year, as against \$1,581,322.32 in the preceding school year. In that year, the 3 per cent occupation tax on net proceeds of mines helped to swell the receipts beyond the usual amount.

From interest on state school land grant funds and rental of state school lands, the revenue last year totaled \$262,834.34, compared with \$242,796.30 the year before. The state high school fund in the last school year produced \$309,206.21, as against \$341,213.94 in the preceding school year when the net proceeds tax helped this fund also.

The reduction in the revenue from the state, coupled with the increased costs, and particularly with the addition of salaries of teachers, caused the increasing of local school levies from \$2,619,142.95 in the year 1918-19 to \$4,282,065.46 in the year 1919-20. The federal government contributed last year \$1,212,307.00, an amount of vocational education as against \$789,775 received by the school districts the year before for this purpose, and \$2,477.91 from the national forests, as compared with \$22,276.33 the year before. Other revenue receipts last year totaled \$115,582.15, comparing with \$90,823.43 the year before.

In addition to bonds and loans, receipts from the sale of school property, \$11,471.28 last year and \$11,697.75 the year before, and receipts from other items totaling \$46,722.19 last year and \$91,232.13 the year before are classed as non-revenue receipts.

Under this classification the revenue receipts of the school districts for the past school year would be \$6,413,596.41, as compared with \$7,178,484.48 the year before, showing that for that year the revenue increased over former year by 7.3 per cent. The increased taxes of the present year for school purposes will bring this rate of increase up sharply.

PIONEER WOMAN DIES.
LOGAN, Dec. 9.—Mrs. Paul Cardon, 85 years of age, pioneer woman of the city, died at her home on East First South street last night. Her husband, Paul Cardon, was one of the first settlers in Cache county, after having resided in Logan for some time the family moved to Benson, where they aided in the settlement of that place. Mrs. Cardon died a few years ago. Many sons and daughters survive Mrs. Cardon. Funeral services will be held Saturday at noon at the Loga tabernacle.

RECOMMENDS WOMAN ON INSANITY BOARD

SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—Recommendation that a woman be placed on the state board of insanity by legislative provision, and a report on the survey of mental defectives now being conducted in Utah, are features of the biennial report of the state board of insanity by Dr. George E. Hyde, superintendent of the state mental hospital. Dr. Hyde points out that there are 332 women patients in the hospital of the total number of inmates of 662, at the close of the fiscal year, November 29. He believes that a woman on the board which directs the policy of the institution would be of great benefit.

The census of feeble-minded has increased to 1,000 in the last year, 600 school children up to the fifth grade in sixteen counties of Utah. There are approximately 1,500 definitely feeble-minded in the state, of this number only 40 per cent, or 600, would require segregation or institutional care. This 600 is made up as follows: 100, absolutely helpless, forty-five imbeciles, who can read and feed themselves, and do simple work; 255 morons, who become known because of their anti-social acts, and who can work under direction; 300.

RECLAMATION BOARD TO MEET IN SALT LAKE

SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—The executive committee of the Western States Reclamation association will hold a special meeting here today and possibly tomorrow for the purpose of discussing and preparing a definite program regarding reclamation work to congress. The call for the meeting was issued by Governor D. W. Davis of Idaho.

The committee consists of thirteen reclamation experts, one from each of the thirteen western states. Former Governor William Spry is secretary of the committee, and he will arrive in Salt Lake from Washington just in time to participate in the gathering. There is to be a concerted effort made for the passage of a reclamation measure. This effort is understood, will concentrate on the Smith-Fletcher bill, which calls for an appropriation of \$50,000,000 and provides for reclamation of the arid lands of the west, swamp lands of the south, and other lands of the northwest and abandoned farms of the east. It is the impression among western reclamation experts that the Smith-Fletcher bill has a better chance of passage by congress than any of the other proposed reclamation bills, for it provides for the expenditure of a part of the appropriation in all sections of the country and the usual sectional feeling over such a measure is eliminated.

LOGAN BISHOP, NATIVE OF SWITZERLAND, DIES

LOGAN, Dec. 10.—Godfrey Fuhrman, 61 years old, bishop of Providence third ward, died yesterday afternoon from hemorrhage of the brain. He had been ill but a short time. Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon.

MAD DOG RUNS AMUCK IN SALT LAKE CITY

SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—Suspicion that the dog which bit Deputy Sheriff Edwin Larson of Murray Tuesday was afflicted with rabies was confirmed yesterday and it was found that the dog, which had been ill but a short time, had bitten three school children before it met death by a bullet from the deputy sheriff's gun.

The stories as told by Dr. T. H. Beatty, state health commissioner, indicated that the dog, a stray and apparently a cross between the Airedale and shepherd breeds, appeared first on Tuesday at the Liberty school, about one mile south of Murray. There it bit Vart Myers, about 12 years of age, and a pupil at the school. It was next seen near the Murray high school, where Richard Larson and Burdette Reading, boys about 13 years old, were attacked and bitten. It tried to bite a number of others, but was beaten off. One of the high school boys who was wounded off further attacks by grabbing the animal by the throat.

The dog's mouth was already stained with blood at the time it attacked the high school and it is thought to have bitten a number of other dogs in Murray in the intervening time.

SALT LAKE DOCTOR DECLARED NOT GUILTY

SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—Jury in the United States district court yesterday returned a verdict of not guilty against Dr. T. O. Duckworth for violation of the Harrison drug act. The jury was instructed by Judge Tillman D. Johnson to return the verdict acquitting the physician after two and one-half hours had been spent in arguing the motion of counsel for dismissal of the case.

Dr. Duckworth was indicted for the alleged unlawful administration of morphine and cocaine to George C. Nurney of Suffolk, Va., last July while the latter was a guest at the New Grand hotel.

U. S. MARSHAL DISPOSES OF CONFISCATED AUTO

SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—United States Marshal Arthur N. Nixey disposed of an automobile yesterday, the first to be confiscated in Utah under the national prohibition act. The machine was taken from Fred Brown, Jack Fleming and J. C. Campbell, who were alleged to have transported liquor in the machine. J. W. Hall of Salt Lake purchased the automobile yesterday.

PERMANENT PURCHASING OFFICE IS RECOMMENDED

SALT LAKE, Dec. 10.—In a biennial report of the state board of examiners, a permanent office of state purchasing agent, or of state purchasing agents, is recommended. The report was filed with Governor Bamberg yesterday.

It is reported that the office, during the present biennium, has saved the state much more than the operations cost of the office. The board also recommends that each department have a revolving fund which would simplify minor transactions in each office. Some of the state institutions already have such funds although the legality has never been definitely established.
