

JOHN I. HART DIES; AGED 94

Widely Known Churchman
Passes Away at Home
In Hooper

John Isaac Hart died this morning at 5:25 o'clock at the home of his granddaughter, Mrs. Oscar Childs, at Hooper, after five days' illness resulting from paralysis. He was 94 years old. He was born December 11, 1826, in Tinton, Eng., was converted to the L. D. S. faith in 1844. He was baptized March, 1848, and came to Utah in 1853. He resided in Salt Lake for a few years, coming to Ogden in 1855. He had always been a resident in Ogden and Weber county with the exception of nineteen years, during which time he worked as a missionary for the L. D. S. church. He opened a mission at Pueblo, Colo., and went on four missions to England and opened a mission in Arizona. He was bishop of the West Weber ward from 1871 to 1885, and president of the seventy quorum for 22 years.

Mr. Hart is survived by the following sons and daughters: Mrs. Elizabeth Manning of Hooper; John W. Hart of Rigby; Walter Hart of West Weber; Mrs. Anna Stansur of Hansen, Idaho; Edward Hart of Twin Falls; Mrs. Sophia Nelson of Ogden; Heber Hart of Garland; Wilford Hart of Ogden; Mrs. Ruth Cook of Pueblo; Isaac Hart of Pueblo; Mrs. E. Smot of Silverville; Mrs. Alice Lynd of Pueblo, and Miss Violet Hart of Pueblo. Also surviving him are 63 grandchildren, 115 great grandchildren, and nine great-great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Thursday morning at 11 o'clock in the Hooper ward meeting house. Bishop James R. Beas will officiate. The body may be viewed at Lindquist's this afternoon and Wednesday until 10 o'clock when it will be taken to the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Manning at Hooper. Interment will be in the city cemetery.

CLEAR SLATE IN DISTRICT COURT

More Than Thirty Criminal
Cases Dismissed By
Judges

General housecleaning was on the boards yesterday afternoon in both divisions of the district court and Judges A. W. Agee and A. E. Pratt dismissed more than thirty criminal cases which have been pending for the past five years. Dismissal was asked by District Attorney Stuart F. Dobbie.

In many of the cases the complaining witnesses had left the state or bonds had been forfeited by order of the court. The majority of the cases comprised informations in connection with search and seizure warrants issued in liquor cases. One of the cases dismissed was that of the state against Fred Fife and E. Sanford, charged with grand larceny. When the men were tried upon the charge of holding up and robbing a man near the viaduct, the jury failed to agree. No further action was taken pending the good behavior of the defendants.

The case of the state against Chauncey Kemery, charged with grand larceny was dismissed owing to the recent death of Kirby E. Smith, the complaining witness in the case. The \$300 cash bond furnished by the defendant was declared forfeited to the state.

CHICAGO NOW OPENS ITS BUILDING TRUST INQUIRY

CHICAGO, Dec. 21.—The federal grand jury's investigation of the alleged building trust in Chicago opened today with several truck loads of records books and contracts as evidence. Thirty-three subpoenas were issued last week against secretaries of lumber companies and carpenters organizations by United States District Attorney Charles F. Glynn.

It is alleged that the so-called organization of Chicago builders has made an effort to exclude all building materials not manufactured in Chicago.

JAP RUNS AMUCK AND STARTS AUSTRALIAN RIOT

LONDON, Dec. 21.—The Central News Perth, Australia, correspondent says that an armed Japanese, claiming racial equality, ran amuck at Broke this morning and a riot resulted. During the fighting two Japanese were killed and others injured, according to the correspondent, who adds that troops subsequently patrolled the town and disarmed all the Japanese in it.

COLD WAVE IN SOUTH

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Dec. 21.—A cold wave was predicted by the weather bureau today. Temperatures ranging between 20 and 25 are expected by Wednesday morning.

WILSON'S ENVOY GREET'S PRESIDENT OF BRAZIL

RIO DE JANEIRO, Dec. 21.—Bainbridge Colby, the American secretary of state, arrived here this morning on board the battleship Florida from the United States.

Mr. Colby, who is accompanied by General Cronkite and Admiral Bassett, representing the United States army and navy, respectively, came to Brazil to return the visit of President Pessoa to the United States. The Florida sailed from Newport News, Va., December 4.
