CONTINUE LIGHT RATE HEARINGS

Judge Howell Represents U. I. C. and Bamberger Line in Arguments

SALT LAKE, Dec. 23.—James A. Howell, of Ogden, judge-elect for the Second judicial district, represented the Utah-Idaho Central and the Bamberger Electric railroads in arguments yesterday before the supreme court on the appeal of holders of special contracts with the Utah Power and Light company. The cases went up on writs of certiorari from district court of the commission, which places the contract-holders on the same schedule as other power users with similar service.

The commission's decision, if found valid, will increase the revenue of the power company at the rate of about \$1,000,000 a year, it is estimated. It was pointed out by John F. MacLane, counsel for the power company, yesterday, however, that the decision of the commission in the special contract case carries with it a proviso for the Utah Power and Light company must hold the additional amounts contributed to the holders of special contract-holders until the other case now before the commission is decided.

This case involves the general rate structure for power service of the power company. Should the commission find in that case that the rates formerly paid by the contract-holders were reasonable, the additional amounts paid in are to be refunded. For this reason the commission retained jurisdiction in the contract case pending the decision of the rate case.

Arguments were presented yesterday by A. R. Barnes, representing some of the coal companies, holding special contracts with the power company; by J. A. Howell, judge-elect in the Second judicial district, representing the Bamberger Electric railroad company and the Utah-Idaho Central Railroad company and by Frank Johnson, representing one of the metal mining companies. MacLane represented the power company which was made defendant in the petition for writs of certiorari and Herbert Van Dam, Jr., assistant attorney general, spoke briefly for the utilities commission itself. Reply was made by Russell G. Lucas, representing the Utah Copper company, the largest of the contract-holders.

IRRIGATION DISTRICT PLANNED FOR CACHE

LOGAN, Dec. 23.—Organization of the Peterboro-Mendon irrigation district, comprising an area of 3,000 acres, has been started in Cache county.

The county commissioners, acting upon the petition of land owners in the proposed district, will apply to the state engineer for a survey and water allotment. It is expected that the survey will begin immediately after the first of the year. The territory concerned is now partly served by the recently installed Sween pumping plant, which has a capacity for raising 100 second-feet of water from the Bear river to a height of sixty-seven feet, with one or two auxiliary pumping plants for taking water out of the river at still higher levels. It is planned to take over this plant and the water rights, extend the system to serve additional lands and bond the district to make the payments.

Hope is expressed that the work can be done in time to get water on to the additional lands in 1921.

NO PRESENT FUNDS FOR SOLDIERS' MEMORIAL

SALT LAKE, Dec. 23.—Funds from the state to provide for the construction of a soldier memorial building at Salt Lake probably cannot be appropriated for at least two years, according to Governor-elect Charles R. Mabey, who spoke yesterday at a meeting of the American Legion.

Wesley E. King, who was present at the meeting, said that there were many business men of the city who were desirous of contributing money for the structure, and if the state gives its moral support the building will probably be erected.

Mr. Mabey promised the legion members that he would be pleased to receive any suggestions from them during his term of office. A similar declaration was made by Congressman-elect E. O. Leatherwood.

SEEKING DIVISION POINT

DELTA, Dec. 22.—Reports are current in the community that the freight division of the Salt Lake Route will be moved from Lyngdyl to Oasis, a few miles south of here, in the near future.

The report has not been confirmed, but the business interests of Delta have presented this town's claims to the shops, should there be a change and has assured the railroad authorities that Delta will take any steps necessary to make the location here desirable to the railroad.

LAW BESTS, CUPID

POCATELLO, Idaho, Dec. 22.—The arm of the law broke the wedding plans of A. W. Johnson last night, when he was arrested for having moonshine hidden in his possession. The wedding day had been set, but when Johnson drew a \$100 fine today he decided he would serve the sentence in jail and postpone his union for sixty-day days.

His money is to be saved for the wedding trip, Johnson said.

STATE AUDITOR SELECTS AIDS

Coalville Man to Become Auditor of Counties Under Mark Tuttle

SALT LAKE, Dec. 23.—Appointment of several additional deputies in the office of the state auditor was announced yesterday by State Auditor-elect, Mark Tuttle. C. R. Jones of Coalville, former county clerk of Summit county and one time a clerk of the Summit county school district, will become auditor of counties.

T. E. Walters will be auditor of state institutions, Delos A. Jewkes will handle the state road accounts, Walter A. Day will act as chief deputy state auditor.

Ogden Debater Helps B. Y. U. Beat Princeton

PROVO, Dec. 23.—Upholding the negative of the question "Resolved: That the state should pass a law prohibiting strikes in essential industries (constitutionality waived)," the debating team of the Brigham Young University at Provo defeated the debating team from Princeton university at the college hall last evening.

District Judge A. B. Morgan of Provo presided at the debate and the judges of the contest were Chief Justice E. E. Corfman and Justice S. R. Thurman of the supreme court of Utah and Judge Harold M. Stephens of the third district court, all of Salt Lake.

Charles Denby Jr., John F. Currie, and Alfred McCormick, were members of the Princeton team while the B. Y. U. team was made up of Ernest Wilkenson of Ogden, George F. Ballif and E. H. Harter.

The decision was two to one in favor of the Utah team. Following the debate, the judges, team members and others were guests of the domestic science department at a banquet.

Ernest Wilkenson is an Ogden young man. He was graduated by the Weber-Norwich college. During the time he was a student he was prominent in the forensic affairs of the local institution. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. O. Wilkenson of 1702 Gibson avenue.
