

RUSS RED AGENT WILL LEAVE U. S.

Departure of 'Ambassador' Means Cancellation of Contracts, He Says

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Ludwig C. A. K. Martens, Russian soviet "ambassador" to the United States, Monday notified the department of labor that upon instruction from the Moscow government just received by cable he will surrender himself for deportation January 2.

CONTRACTS CANCELLED.
Cancellation of all contracts negotiated for the Russian government with American firms, such as Martens to amount to some \$50,000,000, was ordered.

EFFORTS COMMENDED.
The message continued: "The hostility of the present American administration expressed in this act cannot reflect the opinion of the American people, especially of the American workers who have given so many warmly appreciated proofs of sympathy with the workers and peasants of Russia."

OTHER NATIONS WANT TRADE.
"Even now we are certain the masses of the American people will in due time bring about such an understanding. At the present moment, however, we are confronted with the cold fact that America, who repeatedly avowed her good will toward the people of Russia and with who Russia for many reasons was eager to develop mutually advantageous co-operation in the economic field, makes such co-operation impossible. This is done at a time when most other nations of the world, even such as openly conducted war against us and wasted no time on sentimental assurances of friendship, are entering into economic relations with Russia."

Martens asserted that continued refusal to resume trade relations with Russia will nullify a \$6,000,000 order for American goods, alleged to have been brought to this country by Washington D. Vanderby, of Los Angeles, who recently announced that he had procured a 400,000 square mile concession in Siberia for a California syndicate.

There are about 15 Russians in Martens' staff here, and he has applied for permission for them and his family to accompany him home.

GALLI-CURCI, OPERA STAR, TO WED HER ACCOMPANIST
CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—Mrs. Annetta Galli-Curci, grand opera star of Chicago, announced Monday her approaching marriage to Homer Samuel, her accompanist. Mrs. Galli-Curci will complete her naturalization here on January 16, 1921, and friends of the soprano expect her marriage to Mr. Samuel to take place on the same day.

Mrs. Galli-Curci, who was formerly the wife of Marcus Laig C. Church, obtained a divorce from him here a year ago.

SHOPMEN LAID OFF.
AURORA, Ill., Dec. 28.—Orders were received here today to lay off 25 per cent. of the employees of the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railroad shops December 31. About 2000 men are employed in the shops.

SOCIALISTS RAP WILSON PARDONS

Murderers and Other Crooks Released, But of Debs, They Assert

CHICAGO, Dec. 28.—Agitation for the release of all "political prisoners," and restoration of political liberty "until the last vestige of Wilsonism is erased," was promised in a statement from Socialist party headquarters here Monday following the presidential refusal to pardon Eugene V. Debs at Christmas.

MURDERERS FREED.
"We refuse to believe," the statement says, "that President Wilson, who has pardoned murderers, bank robbers, burglars, adulterers of food, German spies, dope dealers, bank wreckers and other choice criminals, speaks for the American people when he continues to keep in prison a political opponent."

JAILED FOR OPINIONS.
"The principle involved is simple. Have the American people the right to express their honest opinions on any subject, political, economical, social or religious? If they have, then it is a crime against the American people to send men and women to prison for the expression of their opinions, and the man who, by his own deliberate act, keeps such people in prison, sins against the whole American people. If they have not, then our pretensions at democracy and liberty are a lie and a sham, and the sooner we discard the pretense the better."

SOUTH AMERICAN CITIES WELCOME U. S. SECRETARY
MONTEVIDEO, Dec. 28.—Estimable Colby, American secretary of state who arrives here today, faces a busy program of entertainment which will continue until Friday night. A ball by the American colony, a dancing party by the Uruguayan club and a banquet by the municipality, are features of the entertainment program. Elaborate police arrangements were made to control the throngs at the dock.

BIENOS AIRES, Dec. 28.—Immediately after the arrival of Secretary of State Colby in this city on Saturday he will be received by Senator Torrico, acting minister of foreign affairs, who will accompany him to the office of President Irigoyen.

BREWERY WANTS TO MAKE BEER FOR MEDICINAL USE
MILWAUKEE, Dec. 28.—A Wisconsin brewery has asked permission to make beer for medicinal purposes. It was announced today by Nelson A. White, chief inspector in the office of Thomas A. Delaney, prohibition director. The request was refused tentatively.

FIVE PERSONS IN FAMILY DIE WHEN HOME BURNS
CLINTON, Ia., Dec. 28.—Five members of the family of N. T. Montgomery, of Clinton, including his daughter, Mrs. George Mitchell, her husband and three children, were burned to death in a fire, which destroyed their home in Wichita, Kan., Christmas eve, according to word received here.

BISHOP PLEADS UNITY OF CHURCH

Inclusion of Roman Catholic And Russian Churches in One Body Is Urged

BOSTON, Dec. 28.—Bishop William Lawrence of the Protestant Episcopal diocese of Massachusetts pleaded for church unity that would include the Roman Catholic and eastern churches, at an inter-denominational church conference here Monday.

PATH OF REUNION.
"I have felt," said Bishop Lawrence, "that the reunion of churches can come by the quiet, subtle influence of prayer, that will melt the differences. In the holy communion there is the best of unity. Let this have a vision of all Christian people, including the whole world, including the Roman Catholic church, and the Russian church. If you are going to have unity you can do nothing that will shut out that great body of Christian people."

Bishop Lawrence was asked whether the validity of other church services was recognized by the Church of England. He replied that much depended upon the meaning of the words "clergyman" were out to minister to all.

INFLUENCE OF ORDINATION.
"That is an administrative feature," Bishop Lawrence replied, "I do not believe I had more authority or power the day after ordination than the day before."

Bishop William Hughes, of the Methodist Episcopal church, who presided, declared that he would not take another ordination "for a million dollars."

LOST BALLOON TRACED BY CANADIAN AIR CURRENTS
OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 28.—The missing United States naval balloon A-355 with three naval officers, a board which floated away from Rockaway naval air station, New York, December 13, and was swallowed by the mist of the northland after being last sighted at Wells, N. Y., is believed to have descended near Lake Temiskaming, 200 miles northwest of here. Rupert Stupart, director of the Dominion meteorological bureau at Toronto, reported today that a careful analysis of winds and other atmospheric conditions obtaining during the flight made it nearly certain that the gas bag had been carried into the Temiskaming region. Lake Temiskaming is an elongated body of water forming part of the Quebec-Ontario line at the headwaters of the Ottawa river.

Among the state superintendents of instruction invited are Miss Ethel E. Redfield, Idaho; J. A. Churchill, Oregon; L. J. Muir, Texas, Arizona.

PINEBLUFF, Ark., Dec. 28.—Six of twelve prisoners who escaped from the state convict farm at Tucker Sunday night were reported surrounded on an island in the Arkansas river near Pinesville, Ark., early today. Posses were preparing to cross to the island in an attempt to capture them. Four other convicts still are at large.

AGED POOR FARM INMATE HELPS EUROPEAN BABES
OMAHA, Dec. 28.—Hans Anderson, a cripple, for thirty-five years an inmate of the Douglas county poor farm, contributed \$5 to the fund for relief of starving European children, the Nebraska committee in charge of contributions announced.

MESSENGER ROBBED
FORT WORTH, Tex., Dec. 28.—J. L. Howell, messenger for the Guaranty State bank, of Leary, Tex., was robbed of \$10,000 Monday as he was motoring from Cisco to Leary, an oil town in Stephens county. Two men with rifles stopped him and took the money.

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RUSS GIRL WHO CAME TO WED MUST GO BACK

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 28.—Eva Printz, Russian girl who came into Seattle as a stowaway on the steamship Cross Keys in November, planning to be married to Lloyd D. Jacob of San Francisco, has lost her fight for admission to the United States and must be deported to Siberia, according to a telegram received by immigration officials here from Washington yesterday. The United States department of labor was willing to stretch a point and admit Miss Printz. It was announced, but the state department refused to waive passport regulations.

GENERAL HARBOR STRIKE IN NEW YORK THREATENED

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Officers of the New York Towboat exchange and harbor workers' union leaders predict a harbor strike affecting several thousand men on January 1 unless some unforeseen agreement can be reached to avert it. The unions, which claim a membership of 4,000, demand a straight ten-hour day, while the employers offer a sixty-hour week without designating length of shifts.

ANTI-HUN FILM BANNED AFTER GERMAN PROTEST

HAVANA, Cuba, Dec. 28.—Official protest against the exhibition of a moving picture film portraying the execution of Edith Cavell, who was put to death by the Germans in Brussels, October 12, 1915, was made here yesterday by Dr. Franz Karl Zittelmann, German minister to Cuba. As a result of his protest to the state department, the film was withdrawn.

ARMEN GOING TO PANAMA MAY ALIGHT IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 28.—American sailors flying from the northern frontier of Mexico toward Panama may land on Mexican soil, if necessary, official permission being given yesterday. This permission was in response to a request from the United States government, it was announced at the foreign office.

VIOLENT STORM RAGES ON FRENCH WEST COAST

BREST, France, Dec. 28.—A storm of utmost violence is raging along the western coast of France. The sea is very heavy, even in the roads of Brest harbor, where a vessel was sunk last night.
