SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION SET

Tri-State Organizations to Meet Sunday At Weber Normal College

Taking the form of a practical demonstration of the work of the organization, the annual tri-state Sunday school convention of the Ogden, North Weber and Weber stakes will be held in the Weber Normal college next Sunday. Sessions will be held at 9 and 10 o'clock in the morning and at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

Every member of the general board from Salt Lake is expected to be present and all local Sunday school workers, including members of stake boards and officers and teachers from all the wards are urged to attend. Stake presidencies, high councilors and ward bishops are also expected to be present.

The general public is not invited to attend owing to lack of accommodations. It is anticipated that at least fourteen hundred Sunday school workers will be at the convention and crowded conditions will prevail under the best of arrangements.

PUPILS' VIEWPOINT. It is announced that the convention will be a practical demonstration in getting the point of view of the pupils of the various classes toward: (1) "The Spiritual Life," (2) "The Principles of the Gospel," (3) "Religious Meetings, With Particular Attention to the Sunday School," (4) "What Constitutes Good Teaching."

There will also be discussion of the development of personality of a Sunday school teacher.

The 9 o'clock meeting will be for stake workers, stake presidencies and high councilors and ward bishops. Subjects for discussion at this meeting will include "Stake Problems" to be conducted by a member of the general board. The results of last year's convention, stake union meetings and functions of stake board members, will also be introduced for discussion.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY. A general assembly of all Sunday school workers will be held in the college auditorium at 10 o'clock. The program includes congregational singing and the discussion of the following subjects by members of the general board: "The Sunday School Teachers' Standard of Excellence," "Power and Personality," "Speak No Ill."

Department work will be taken up at 11 o'clock when subjects appropriate to the various grades of the schools will be presented. Luncheon will be served at 12:30 o'clock. Department work will be resumed at 2 o'clock and general assembly at 4 o'clock when the subject "The Winning of the Boys and Girls" will be the subject of an address by a member of the general board.



PALMER SUED FOLLOWING BOMB SUSPECT'S DEATH. NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The Italian chamber of labor announced that a \$300,000 damage suit had been filed here in state supreme court against other officials of the department of Justice in connection with the death of Andrew Spisado, who jumped four times under detention at department headquarters here in connection with the bomb outrages of June, 1919.

The suit brought by Spisado's widow, named also William J. Flynn, chief of the department's bureau of investigation. It was charged that Spisado had been beaten "terribly" and "tortured mentally and physically" that he had lost his mind and become suicidally despondent. The chamber announced that one of the charges had been against the Italian embassy at Washington.
