ASSISTANCE RUSHED TO YANK SHIP IN DISTRESS

LONDON, Jan. 12.—Assistance has been sent from Bremen to the American steamer Defiance reported in distress 13 miles east of Norderney lightship, off the mouth of the river Ems. The steamer's turbine is said to be damaged and she is leaking.
