

SAYS BUSINESS GOOD IN OGDEN

San Francisco Notes Smiles Here and Frowns Elsewhere

Business conditions in Ogden, Logan and Brigham City are far better than in any other sections of the western states, said Jack Breeden, traveling salesman for a San Francisco firm who was an Ogden visitor today. In the northwest on the Pacific coast and in the southwestern part of the United States, the smiles that appear on the faces of the men and women of Logan, Brigham and Ogden are not evident, according to Mr. Breeden.

"I have been on the road for more than six months on this trip and in my entire travels I have not met so many smiles as I have received in Ogden, Brigham and Logan," Mr. Breeden stated. "A few days ago I arrived in Ogden en route to Salt Lake. Between train time I met and chatted with several friends here and noted that general trend of business appeared to be tending upward. Arriving at Salt Lake I was greeted with frowns, frowns and more frowns.

"The Salt Lake meeting drove me immediately back to Ogden and let it be said that when I saw the smiles and the general trend of business in this city and Cache Valley are far superior to those in other sections I am not in the least exaggerating. As a unit the Ogden people and the Ogden merchants have taken the change in times with the right spirit and things appear to be moving smoothly here."

OGDEN SHOWS BUILDING GAIN

Only City in West to Record Increase During January

Ogden is the only city in the western states to show a gain in building operations in January, 1922, compared with January, 1921, according to figures announced in the office of the city engineer this morning. Ogden gained seven per cent over last year in January, while most cities show a heavy loss. The figures check with statistics announced in Chicago yesterday by the American Contractors' association.

FILE OBJECTIONS TO SWIFT PLAN

Government Fails to Approve Method for Separating Stockyards

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15.—Objections to the substitute plan of Swift & company and Assour & company for disposal of their stockyard interests were filed today in the district supreme court by the department of justice. The government brief said the plan did not provide for an early and complete divestment by the packers of their holdings in the yards as required by the consent decree of January 4, 1920.

The sale of \$6,000,000 in bonds has been contemplated as a means of putting North Dakota back on a sound financial basis.

LARGE STATE BANK IN IOWA IS CLOSED

SIoux CITY, Ia., Feb. 16.—The Union Trust & Savings bank, of Sioux City, a state institution, closed its doors this morning and the Iowa bank examiner is in charge. The liabilities of the bank are placed at \$1,000,000 but no estimate of assets has been given out. About \$500,000 was on deposit.

WOMAN IN COURT FOR CARRYING GUN

AIR MAIL OFFICIALS PROBE FATAL CRASH

LA CROSSE, Wis., Feb. 16.—Colonel John A. Jordan, chief of construction of the aviation service, Major William McChord, chief of the United States air service, central department, and Lieutenant R. G. Pace, air mail test pilot, appointed by Otto Praeger, second assistant postmaster general, to investigate the cause of the mail plane accident here, in which three aviators were killed last Wednesday arrive here today.

That there was no explosion in mid-air, but there was a backfire of the engine which probably shot sparks into the lap of Pilot Rowe and caused him to lose control of the machine, was the testimony of witnesses.

BUTTE WOMAN HELD IN SALT LAKE CITY

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 16.—Leola Cresswell has been arrested here on information furnished by the British agent, authorities that she had absconded from Butte with \$2,500. She saved \$1,000 cash bond in the city court to assist in any complaint filed against her. Mrs. Cresswell declared that the money in question was taken from a joint account of herself and her husband in a Butte bank.

MASKED PAIR ROBS OGDENITE

George Salarno Relieved of \$50 At West End of Viaduct

Accounted by two armed and masked men last night at the west end of the Twenty-fourth street viaduct, George Salarno of Wilson lane, was held up and robbed of \$50, he told the police. The holdup occurred at 10 p. m.

When Salarno notified the police, Detectives Joseph McLean, Ed Butterfield and Sergeant A. H. Stephens immediately set out for the scene of the holdup.

The robbers escaped.

Salarno described the men as being large and tall. They were both dressed in black suits and hats, both were armed and wore masks.

SMOOT OBJECT OF SENATE LAUGH

Solons Guffaw When Opponent of Tariff Crowds Utah From His Position

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16.—The senate made progress in its consideration of the Farney emergency tariff bill yesterday and when the session ended, it had adopted four of the nine remaining amendments recommended by its finance committee.

Senator McCumber, Republican, North Dakota, in charge of the bill, said prospects were good for a vote today. When it became apparent that the bill would not be passed, Mr. McCumber sought to conclude consideration of all committee amendments. This plan suffered defeat.

Among amendments accepted was the substitute sugar amendment proposed by Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah. The amendment would place the tariff at one cent per pound in addition to the present duty of the same amount.

Other amendments adopted would provide rules as follows:

Buller and butter substitutes, eight cents per pound; chicken and chicken substitutes, 23 cents per gallon; cream, five cents per gallon.

PHILAS OBJECTS.

Senator Thomas Denney, Colorado, alone voted against the Smoot sugar duty, while 67 were recorded for it. In joining with supporters of the bill, who could not be induced to amend, Democratic opponents claimed to have won a point which, it was said, will eventually cause trouble for the measure's proponents. The near-unanimous vote, it was declared, will force the senate conference committee to hold out to the end against house conferees. The house refused three times to add sugar to the commodity for which protection was afforded.

Trite arguments and acrimonious charges as well as logic characterized the debate. Senator Williams, Democrat, Mississippi, held the attention of seventy senators for more than an hour in an attack on the tariff bill that sparkled with wit, sarcasm and acerbity. Scolded, if ever, he has many senators say, he today, unimpaired of other matters, to listen to a speech.

The senator charged proponents of the emergency tariff with seeking to legislate money out of the pockets of the public into the pockets of those benefited. He declared that the tariff provisions on sugar were such as to make any industry profitable, and added:

"I can raise bananas in New Jersey. If you will give me a tariff, I'd sell them for a dollar a banana. That would be profitable if the tariff was high enough."

Senator Williams, as he waded deeper and deeper into the arguments against the measure, also noted across the aisle to where Senator Smoot sat. Mr. Smoot finally gave way and in the place from which the senate many times has heard preached the doctrine of high tariffs there was delivered an argument opposed. It caused a roar of laughter, but did not disturb the speaker.

UTAH ASKED TO ISSUE BONDS

Governor Mabey Asks Legislation to Authorize Million and Half

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 16.—Governor Charles R. Mabey, in a message to the Utah legislature today asks that a bond issue of \$1,500,000 be raised to meet highway construction needs and to meet a deficit in the state's general fund. If the bond issue is decided upon by the legislature, it will mean that Utah will be within \$1,500,000 of its total borrowing power—\$10,000,000.
