220-YARD DASH RECORD BROKEN

Paddock Clips Two-Fifths of a Second Off in Coast Contest

BERKELEY, Cal., March 26.—Charles Paddock, University of Southern California, clipped two-fifths of a second off the world's record for the 220-yard dash here today, covering the distance in 20.4 seconds. Four watches caught him at this speed, and one at 20.3 seconds. His record was made in a meet with the University of California.

Today's marks were made on a straightaway track which has a local reputation for being fast. Paddock last year ran the hundred on it in the unofficial time of 9.3-5 seconds. California won the meet, 105 to 26.

Officials of the meet said an effort would be made to have the Amateur Athletic union recognize the mark as a record but that because there was a slight breeze at times during the afternoon, they believed there might be some difficulty about this.

The breeze would have favored the runners, they said, but the starter had been instructed to hold the men until there was a full and had done so. Paddock got away to a good start and led all the way. Hutchinson, University of California, was second, and unofficial timers said he made the distance one-fifth of a second slower. Paddock, the new record holder, won the final 220-yard dash in the trials for the American team at Boston last July in 21.1-5, running the distance for the first time in his career in record time.

STOOD SINCE 1906
The former record for the 220-yard dash was held jointly by four of America's greatest runners, Barney Wellers of Philadelphia was the first in America to step the furlong off in 21.1-5 seconds, the record which stood from 1904 up until yesterday.

Paddock of the University of California shattered the mark.

In 1912 Howard Drew, the noted colored runner, tied the mark made by Wellers in a track meet at Los Angeles.

HAYMOND EQUALS IT
Creed Haymond of the Ogden A. A. and former star at the University of Utah and University of Pennsylvania has stepped the distance off four times in his career in the remarkable time of 21.1-5, a feat which no other runner in the world has ever accomplished.

STORM LEAVES DEATH IN WAKE

DUBLIN, March 26.—The day appointed for the preliminaries necessary to bring the home rule act into operation has been fixed for April 1, both northern and southern parliaments starting simultaneously. The Irish leader for Ireland will issue proclamations for the elections under the act which will be held in May both in the north and south.

WESTPORT, County Mayo, Ireland, March 26.—(By The Associated Press.)—Pandemonium prevailed here early today when crown forces engaged in reprisals for a recent ambush near here. There was continuous gun fire in various parts of the town for several hours. Houses and shops were wrecked with bombs and furniture and other effects were burned.

DUBLIN, March 26.—A bomb attack was made this morning on two lorries belonging to the air forces. Two of the air force contingent and several civilians were wounded, the latter by bomb splinters.

TACOMA, Wash., March 26.—Union carpenters today announced a voluntary reduction from \$8 to \$7 a day. The announcement was made by C. B. Gaskill, recording secretary of the union, who said the cut would become effective Monday next. The purpose of the cut was to stimulate building, it was said.

WARSAW, Indiana, March 26.—The grand jury investigation of the death of LeRoy Lovett, 19-year-old Elkhart, Ind., youth, was adjourned this afternoon but will be resumed Monday. Virgil Decker, 18-year-old chum of the Lovett boy, is held on a charge of murder during the grand jury's investigation.

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NAVAL PAYMASTER SKIPS WITH FUNDS

BOSTON, Mass., March 26.—The disappearance a week ago of Ensign Joseph J. Lynam, assistant paymaster of the scout cruiser Chester, was followed today by the discovery that he had left a shortage of \$22,000 of naval funds.

A naval board of inquiry convened by Rear Admiral Herbert O'Dunn, commanding the first naval district, opened Lynam's safe today and found only \$90. Orders were issued to department of justice and navy intelligence agents to seek him on charges of embezzlement and absence without leave.

Lynam, who rose from the ranks, enlisted from Tennessee, but in recent years his family had made their home at Newport, R. I. He has a wife and two children there. He is 31.

Naval investigators are understood to be checking up South American routes in their efforts to trace Lynam's movements.

It was understood Buenos Aires was Lynam's destination. The inquiry also turned to Lynam's acquaintance with members of a musical comedy company, whom he entertained in this city.

St. Louis Men and Three Assistants Accused of Wrecking Series.

CHICAGO, March 26.—Carl Zork, shirt-waist manufacturer, and Ben Levi, min Franklin, both of St. Louis were charged today by officials of the state's attorney's office with being the organizers of the alleged plot through which Chicago White Sox players were secured to have thrown the 1919 world series to Cincinnati.

Announcement that these two men would be formally accused when brought to trial with engineering the alleged deal was made by the state's attorney's office after indictments against eighteen men, including Zork and Franklin, had been returned by the Cook county grand jury, which today finished the second investigation into the baseball scandal.

ORGANIZED AREAS
Joseph J. Sullivan, known in the case as a gambler, Louis and Ben Levi, formerly of Des Moines, Iowa, and Abe Attel, were linked with Zork and Franklin by the state officials in announcing the results of the jury investigation.

Sullivan, officials said the evidence showed, handled operations in the east, the Levi brothers directed the alleged conspiracy in the central west with Des Moines, headquarters, and Attel acted as traveling agents.

OTHERS RE-INDICTED
The charges created a sensation in baseball circles, for although Zork, Franklin and the Levi brothers were mentioned by witnesses before the first grand jury which conducted its investigations last fall, none was indicted at that time. Sullivan and Attel were indicted then, however.

Zork, Franklin, the Levi brothers and David Zeller, who was said to be well known in both Des Moines and San Francisco, were indicted today. In addition the thirteen men indicted last fall were re-indicted. These men were Claude Williams, Eddie Cicotte, Joe Jackson, Chick Gandil, Hal Chase, Joseph J. Sullivan, Rachel Brown, Abe Attel and Bill Burns.

LARGE BAIL SET
Each man was named eight times in each indictment and each indictment specified three counts against them, conspiracy to defraud, conspiracy to do an illegal act, and obtaining money under false pretenses.

Bail was fixed at \$2,000 for each count for each time a man was named, making \$24,000. Under law this can be doubled and the state announced that the men would be required to put up \$48,000 bonds.

The state's attorney immediately began preparation of extradition proceedings against the men indicted, but it is not expected that the trial will come up before fall.

Lee Richards Enrolls With Aggie School

OGDEN, March 26.—Lee Richards, former star performer on the athletic field for the Ogden High school and last fall a star on the Army academy gridiron machine, enrolled at the Utah Aggie college here yesterday. Richards played the fullback position on the West Point team. In 1919 he was all-state intercollegiate fullback in the annual selection of Utah sport stars.

Richards is also proficient in baseball, basketball, track and field athletics. In track and field sports he is a weight man. On the diamond he played a nifty game at first base. Richards' appearance in a uniform should increase the athletic spirit at the Aggie lab, observers say. Coach Lowell Romney says Richards will be eligible for the varsity team next fall.
