

CHINESE BURIED WITH HONORS

Leo Tong Goes to Grave With Deck of Cards in His Hand

Chinese residents of Ogden, paid their last respects according to their usual customs, to the memory of Leo Tong, partner of Leo Young, in the Vienna cafe, who was killed on the morning of February 1, supposedly by Laurine Griffin, negro, at his funeral yesterday afternoon.

The funeral was held from the Larkin & Sons' funeral chapel and the profession headed by the Ogden band, and consisting of 15 automobiles.

The procession was viewed by Laurine Griffin at the city jail as it passed east along Twenty-fifth street. She is being held at the jail on the charge of first degree murder.

Resides being engaged in the cafe business, Leo was also known as proprietor of a Chinese gambling house and at Larkin & Sons' chapel a deck of cards was placed in his hands and a 10-cent bet was made on his mouth.

The usual foodstuffs were placed upon the grave in the Chinese section of the City cemetery, where the interment was made and the usual Chinese customs carried out.

As the rich casket was removed from the hearse by the bearers, the hand played a dirge. Then after the casket had been lowered into the grave the Oriental interment rites were conducted at the graveside.

Red papers upon which inscriptions were written were burned. Incense sticks were lighted. Delicacies in bowls and upon platters were placed at the graveside and lighted incense sticks thrust into the food.

The son of the slain man was present. At instructions from an older Chinese, who seemed to be master of ceremonies the boy placed in the grave a flower, a clod of earth and a sheaf of straw colored paper.

SNOW NOT ALL OVER IN OGDEN

Despite Pleasant Outlook Weather Report Indicates More Storm

Seven inches of snow fell last night upon deep banks of snow that were already on Ogden streets from storms of a few days ago and today the streets contain a depth which shatters records for years.

Despite the heavy fall last night and early this morning traffic today in the downtown district was but slightly impeded and the street car lines were open. Snowplows were kept busy during the entire night by the streetcar company and cars operated this morning almost on schedule time.

CAMERAS OUT—The storm came during warm temperatures and the snow hung to trees and wires turning the parks and streets into a fairland of beauty. Scores of citizens brought forth their cameras this morning and snapped the beautiful views at city hall and other parks.

Promises of even more snow is made by the weather bureau for tonight and tomorrow and it is likely that several more inches will come soon. The present warm temperatures will continue, it is predicted, which are likely to cause flooded streets and jammed street openings.

EMERGENCY CREWS—An emergency crew of 40 men worked last night under the direction of Commissioner Arthur F. Larsen and Street Supervisor George Welch in an effort to relieve the flood situation in the southeastern section of the city. The thaw of yesterday caused large volumes of water to sweep down from the hills in the southeastern section, inundating streets and causing many flooded cellars. The crews placed temporary levees around houses in the path of the flood and kept the water out of cellars which had been threatened. Colder temperatures of last night tended to relieve the situation somewhat.

SNOW IN IDAHO—Southeastern Idaho was reported last night in the grip of a furious snowstorm accompanied by winds blowing at 40 miles an hour.

The warm chinook wind of the last 24 hours has melted most of the foot of snow on the ground near Pocatello, and the Portneuf river is overflowing its banks because of the water running on top of the ice.

All trains into Pocatello are from one-half hour to one hour late.

MORE SNOW—Snow and colder was the forecast issued last night for Salt Lake and northern Utah by J. Cecil Alter, meteorologist in charge of the Ogden weather bureau. The drop in temperature, Mr. Alter said, will have a tendency to check the melting and streams flows and remove the danger of basements being flooded.

Rain was reported yesterday along the Pacific coast from San Diego to Seattle. Rain or snow fell as far east as the Rocky mountains, except in Salt Lake, Boise and Los Angeles, according to the records of the bureau. The velocity of the wind yesterday was 40 miles.

SUIT IS FILED AGAINST MEDIC

Dr. Wiley M. Cragun Is Sued for \$25,000 by Babe's Parents

Damages of \$25,000 are sought against Dr. Wiley M. Cragun, Ogden physician, in a suit filed in the district court today by Louise Visser and Joseph Visser, who charge that the physician improperly and unskillfully administered quantities of drugs to their 20-months-old son, Joseph, which caused his death here on January 2, 1921.

The complaint sets forth that on January 1, 1921, the Visser baby suffered burns from hot water upon his arm, side and chest, and Dr. Cragun was called to treat the child.

It is further alleged that the physician "negligently, improperly and unskillfully administered large and excessive quantities of drugs or other substances, of a nature unknown to the plaintiffs, but believed to be morphine." Lack of proper care and attention is also charged. The child died on January 2, 1921.

It is further set forth that Dr. Cragun carried an insurance policy through which he was protected and assured in the event of financial loss which might result by death or injury of any person by him and that by reason of this protection he was less careful and less attentive to the child.

The parents of the child seek \$25,000 damages.


