

WILL SELL AT ANY TERMS STREET CAR COMPANY TELLS OGDEN CITY

Haven't Made Any Money for Five Years; Don't See Any Chance to Make Any and Cannot Pave, Manager Whitney Says

After pleading poverty on the part of the Utah Rapid Transit company and explaining its inability to pave along its tracks on upper Twenty-fifth street or in any other section of the city, W. A. Whitney, general manager of the company this morning told members of the city that the company would sell its lines and equipment to the city or any other company who desired to own it.

"We will sell it upon practically any terms offered," Mr. Whitney said, and then went into detail explaining how the company had not earned money, had \$1,000,000 bonded indebtedness, and practically no money in the bank except that to meet payrolls.

At the conclusion of the explanation Mayor Francis declared that the proposition was not an inviting one for the city.

The discussion arose over the demands made upon the traction company to pave two blocks on upper Twenty-fifth street. Mr. Whitney said today that the company had not a cent available to take part in a paving program and declared again that his company would tear up its tracks on upper Twenty-fifth street if the city commission would permit.

Mr. Whitney said that if the traction company began paving in one section it would set a precedent which would later compel the company to spend approximately \$1,000,000 in paving other sections later when the city paved other streets. He said that it would be impossible to obtain the money for any such work.

The general manager declared the company had not made money for five years and there was little prospect of earnings in the future.

There was no decision made at the meeting although Mr. Whitney agreed that the traction company would macadamize along its tracks on upper Twenty-fifth street if property owners would be satisfied.

The only possible solution to the problem was contained in a suggestion made by Commissioner O. B. Madison, who contended that the property owners on upper Twenty-fifth street should be allowed to vote and decide whether they would accept state along the tracks for the two blocks or vote to have the tracks torn up and abandoned.

No decision on this matter was made at the morning meeting.

Steal Enough to Build House; No Clues Discovered

Thieves believed by the police to have been driving a truck stole 100 feet of hardwood flooring, brick, window sash, window sash containing glass, two shovels, one crowbar, one sledge hammer and one beef fork from a yard located at Twenty-fifth and Wall avenue sometime last night, according to a report made to the police today by George M. Foster, residing at 2766 Washington avenue. They left no clues by which the police officials could trace them.

ROAD EXPERTS INSPECT BRIDGE

State Commissioners View Crossing Declared to Be Dangerous

In response to recent protest of the Weber county commissioners that a detour bridge placed by contractors across the Ogden river in Ogden canyon, while the new steel bridge is being constructed, is unsatisfactory and too narrow, members of the state road commission came to Ogden this morning and went with the commissioners to the canyon to inspect the offending bridge. It is probable that as a result of the visit of the road commission members, the contractor will be compelled to strengthen and widen the bridge.

The county commissioners received protests from farmers who were compelled to cross the bridge that large wagons and trucks were unable to safely pass. The work is solely in the hands of the state and the commissioners protested to the state road commission, asking immediate action.

HEAR CLAIMS OF OGDEN MEN

Industrial Commission in Session Here to Air Complaints

Hearings of three cases of persons seeking compensation as the result of alleged personal injuries are being conducted today in the city hall by William Kneer of the state industrial commission.

The first case to come before the commission is that of George E. Burnett against James J. Burke, as receiver for the Interstate Sugar company at Hooper. Burnett alleges that he suffered injuries at the Hooper plant October 21, 1921, when a mass of beets fell upon his leg. The injury caused blood poisoning, it is alleged, and he seeks compensation for the time he was unable to work.

Joseph Lakin is seeking compensation for injuries alleged to have been received August 21, 1921, while he was employed by the Ogden Iron Works company and a large casting fell upon him, causing internal injuries.

The third case is that of E. E. Gibbons, who was injured when knocked from a ladder in the barns of the Utah Rapid Transit company February 17, 1920. Some compensation has already been paid and the street car company is protesting against paying further sums.

SEMENOFF ALL HE IS CHARGED

H. W. Allen, With S. E. F. Says Ataman Led Gang of Bandits

That Gregorie Semenov, ataman of the Cossacks, was all that has been said about him and a great deal that because of the proprietaries can never be said in print, was the statement yesterday of H. W. Allen of the L. R. Steel corporation, who was with the Siberian expeditionary force at the time that Semenov was terrorizing that country.

One of his favorite pastimes, according to Mr. Allen, was the moving up of one of his armored cars and after training the guns on the buildings of a village, allowing his men to practice by shooting the buildings to pieces irrespective as to whether there were occupants in the houses or not.

On one occasion he moved one of those armored cars into Verkhutinsk where companies A, B and C of the Twenty-seventh infantry and companies M and L of the Thirty-first infantry as well as a machine gun company and a company equipped with one-pounders were stationed.

Colonel Morrow was in command, Mr. Allen said, and he ordered Semenov to remove the armored car immediately, which, after some argument with the Japanese general stationed at that point, was done but only after the American forces had made it plain to both the Japanese general and to Semenov that the order to remove the car was to be backed up by armed troops.

Another favorite stunt of Semenov, Mr. Allen said, was to seek out all persons in any way opposed to the rule of his army and immediately execute them. Mr. Allen said that Semenov's alleged army was nothing more than a group of bandits and that there was no such thing as discipline among them. He said that they were not to be considered soldiers in any sense.

At Valchafolia on one occasion Semenov ordered the immediate execution of a number of women who were believed to have been members at one time of the famous battalion of death the members of which were recruited from among women opposed to the rule of the czar.

COUPLE FACES MURDER CHARGE

SALT LAKE, April 19.—George H. Gardner and his wife, Martha Gardner, were charged jointly with first degree murder today in connection with the shooting to death of Deputy Sheriff Gordon Stuart and the fatal wounding of Joe Irvine at the Gardner ranch at Welby, Utah, last Saturday. Irvine died of wounds at a local hospital this morning.

The Gardners were arraigned but neither pleaded to the charge and hearing was set for next Tuesday.

BRONSON FROUNCHED.
PORTLAND, Ore., April 19.—Jimmy Sacco of Boston gave Muff Bronson, Portland lightweight, a boxing lesson in their 10-round bout here and won an easy decision. In another 10-round bout Joe Egan, Boston middleweight, stopped Billy Wright of Seattle in the sixth round.
