

GRAZING SITUATION IN IDAHO EXCELLENT

The grazing situation on the national forests in Idaho is much better than heretofore with the growers receiving splendid prices for lambs, according to Assistant District Forester C. N. Woods, who has returned to Ogden after spending a month on the Payette national forest along the waters of the Payette and the south fork of the Salmon rivers.

Most of the Idaho wool has been sold at excellent prices, he said, and although the spring season was later than usual the prospects for an excellent forage crop were never better. The ground, he said, was well saturated with moisture and the lower ranges were in splendid condition.

The fruit crop in Idaho this season promises to be one of the heaviest in years and fruit men are now looking forward to a good profit from their crops, he said.

Stockmen reported that the hay crop will in all likelihood be considerably lighter than last year with consequent higher prices due to a lighter acreage having been planted.

HEAVY TRAFFIC FROM CALIFORNIA
