

Gunners Eliminate Logan From Gonfalon Chase

WILLES SETS COLLEGIANS BACK WITH FOUR SCATTERED HITS; FLASHY FIELDING FEATURES

Chavez' Triple Accounts for First Gunner Scores in Second Inning; Logan's Lone Tally Is Scored on Errors; Ogdenites Now Have Chance to Take Title

WILYESTER ("NED") NILES, pitching "ace" of the Ogden Gunners, twirled brilliant baseball Sunday against the Logan Collegians, the Ogdenites putting over a 4 to 1 victory. By virtue of the victory the Gunners still have a fighting chance to grab the pennant for the first half of the season although the Brigham Peaches hold the upper hand.

The big pitcher of the local club toyed with the Peaches. Niles had good change of pace and completely baffled the Logan clan. He allowed but four hits and should have earned a shutout. His own error, however, in the third inning was responsible for the lone Logan tally.

KEY PLAYERS.
Niles' chucking was the best exhibition of the year and gave the Ogden fans confidence for the battle here Tuesday with the Peaches. Logan in losing to Ogden was practically eliminated from the race. The collegians, however, started out in good style and battled the locals until the final man was out in the ninth.

Lefty Gill, from Mesa, Arizona, started to pitch for the visitors. Lefty, however, failed to dish out any kind of a questionable assortment of curves, leaving his team mate, Dimmock, to finish the third out in the first on his first pitched ball. Clark skied to Fitzpatrick.

The Gunners started the fireworks in the second inning. Fallentine singled to left and took second on Jarvis' error. French laid down a bunt which went for an infield hit, Morgan, running for Fallentine, going to third. French stole second. Clark skied to center. Snelgrove popped out to Phillips. Chavez drove in on Gill's offerings down the third base line for a minute for three bases, scoring Morgan and French. Niles skied to Jarvis for the third out.

Logan added her lone score in her half of the third. Fitzpatrick grounded out, Snelgrove to Kilpatrick. Adams lived on Chavez' error in his grounder. Gill beat out an infield hit to third. The third baseman pulled down the drive which looked good for at least two bases. Jarvis went left, Niles heaving the ball into right field, allowing Adams to score. Gill went to third on this play. Jarvis stole second. Falck skied to Peterson. Phillips walked, leading the bases. Nelson flew out to Matthews on the third out.

The Gunners added another score in their half of the fifth. Peterson skied to Falck. Kilpatrick tripled to left field and scored on Matthews' sacrifice fly to Falck. Fallentine singled to center. French singled to center. Clark skied to Falck.

In the seventh Ogden added her final tally. Peterson doubled to center and went to third on Kilpatrick's sacrifice hit. Matthews doubled to left, scoring Peterson. Fallentine grounded out, Nelson to Adams. Matthews going from second to third on the play. French routed out to Kennedy.

Dimmock was touched for six hits during his stay on the rubber. Sensational fielding played a big factor in the game. Peterson raced more than 40 yards in the third inning to spear Falck's line drive with one hand. In the sixth count Dimmock put reverse English on one of Niles' offerings, the ball doing a "shimmy" toward first base.

Matthews, in center for Ogden, pulled down several star catches. Louie Falck, in center field, cut off Kenyon's rally by his sensational fielding. With two men on the paths in the fifth he robbed Clark of a hit that looked good for two bases.

GATHER TWO HITS.
Fallentine, Chavez, Kennedy and French each collected two hits. Bert Spencer, former Ogden star in the Union Association, worked behind the plate and performed his duties as an umpire in a first class order.

Tommy Fitzpatrick played the far corner for Logan and entertained with flashy fielding. Ogdenites are now ready for the battle Tuesday with the Peaches.

BROWNS LEAD PENNANT RACE
How No Signs of Weakening Under Strain of Pace-setting

NEW YORK, July 3.—With the New York Giants still having the National League race well in hand, despite valiant but fruitless efforts by St. Louis and Brooklyn to overtake them, interest in the majors is centered on the spectacular pennant hunt in the American circuit in which our contenders are battling around the plate.

The St. Louis Browns, who have shown no signs of weakening under the strain of pace-setting, held a lead of two and a half games today, but two other clubs—New York, Chicago and Detroit—are bunched close behind, sports concede the Browns and the Yankees are the favorites for the title down the stretch, but either of the other two western contenders, in present form, has at least a fighting chance.

Closing the past week with an old-time burst of slugging, Babe Ruth and team-mates gave further proof that they are recovering from a protracted slump. With a record of eleven wins in fourteen last week, they have rebounded to a disastrous trip against Washington and Philadelphia and today scored their fourth straight victory.

The Chicago White Sox, with their pitchers in rare form, proved the sensation of the race, however, running their winning streak to eight games and displacing Detroit in third place. Good pitching, especially by Walter Johnson who hung up his third straight shutout and the 97th of his major league career, was responsible for an improved showing by Washington. The Browns, proved easy for the Yankees, who made it four straight today.

First division teams all displayed similar form in the National League, the Giants retaining a lead of four and a half games today after double victories on the part of both St. Louis and Brooklyn, while the New Yorkers and Cincinnati kept fourth place by a slim margin today over Pittsburgh and Chicago, despite a double set-back at the hands of the Cardinals. The Philadelphia Athletics, however, are still in the race, but are battling to keep out of last place.
