Habit Clinics To Cure Crime Urged By Expert Who Declares Punishment Does Not Prevent

BOSTON, Dec. 22.—"Fight the crime wave as we fight disease epidemics." That is the answer of Dr. L. Vernon Briggs, famous criminologist, to the problem of increasing murder and lesser crime in America.

In an interview with NEA Service, Dr. Briggs, author of "The Manner of Man That Kills," director of the Massachusetts Society for Mental Hygiene, and member of the American Institute of Criminal Law and Criminology, made these recommendations: Abolish capital punishment. Sentence criminals guilty of capital crime to life imprisonment—and let science study their cases.

Establish "habit clinics" in every city for subnormal and abnormal children between two and seven to prevent possible future criminality.

Dr. Briggs says punishment cannot stop crime because it doesn't remove the cause. He cites the "habit clinic" of Boston, established seven months ago under Dr. Thom, as the only agency directed toward preventing crime by striking the cause of it.

KILL DISEASE, NOT PATIENT. When we fight typhoid, tuberculosis, yellow fever and similar disease epidemics," he says, "we don't kill the people afflicted and destroy the germs and every bit of evidence about them. Instead we study the cases, isolate them, examine the germs microscopically, and find a serum that will cure. Science strives to kill the disease, not the patient."

Why not treat crime like that? Why kill the patient by hanging or electrocution, and kill the evidence with him? Hanging was originally designed as a deterrent—a horrible example because it was public. Now it is secret. The man who suffers from the disease of criminality isn't moved by an example he hears about second hand.

Dr. Briggs suggests legislation that will make capital criminals available for scientific study. But to get at the root of the trouble he would have "habit clinics" established in every city.

"Law is archaic," he says, "when they judge criminals insane on the basis of not knowing right from wrong. By that test 90 per cent of those sent to asylums rather than prison."

CITIZENS ARE HOSTILE

Louisiana Governor Withholds Evidence Obtained By Investigators

SHREVEPORT, La., Dec. 22.—The bodies of two men in high state of decomposition, believed to be Watt Daniels and Thomas F. Richards, missing victims of the Morehouse mob of last August, were found this morning near the Eastland ferry on Lake La Fourche, which separates Moorehouse and Richland parishes, according to the special correspondent of the Shreveport Journal. The limbs of the dead men were tied with wire.

BODIES ARE NAKED

The bodies were nude except for belts and a portion of the trousers. One man's head was gone. It is thought that those who used the explosives left without knowing the bodies had come to the surface.

SEARCH IS SECRET

MERROUGE, La., Dec. 22.—The national guard which has been on guard duty here while the lakes surrounding Merrouge were drained in the search for the bodies of two missing men, kidnaped by a band of masked men on August 24, was ordered to Cooper lake today when guards stationed there discovered a number of men moving about in the shallow water of the lake and fired upon them.
