

MORE PAVING IS TO BE DONE BY CITY

The city board of commissioners last evening accepted the resignation of Robert Fields as dog tax collector for the city, but no name was suggested to fill the vacancy.

Ordinances providing for curb and gutter district 108 and sewer district 115 were passed and the tax collections ordered.

Petitions for the extension of water mains on Tenth street and Grant avenue, Woodland avenue and Thirty-third street and on Seventh west street were granted on the recommendation of Mayor Fell.

Commissioner J. C. Nye reported that repairs would be made on Taylor avenue, between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, at the earliest possible time.

The sexton reported that for the month of May he collected \$523. The report was filed.

The oil inspector reported collected in May the sum of \$6.91.

GRADUATE MUST TAKE WATER TEST

New York, June 3.—Columbia university has taken a new stand in engineering. The authorities decline to award a diploma to Felix Metzger Rosenstock at the commencement exercises tomorrow unless he can prove himself cured of carosiserinusabmetu. In other words, there is a rule at Columbia that no college degree can be issued unless the college student has learned to swim the length of the pool in the gymnasium. The only exception is allowed in the case of physical disability testified to by a physician's certificate. Rosenstock, who has passed all other examinations, completely balked at swimming through his college course and as an excuse he declared he was suffering from a terrible skin disease known as the carosiserinusabmetu. He obtained a physician's signature to this statement. The physical director could find no visible trace of such a malady, but from a Latin lexicon he evolved this explanation of the student's affliction: "Caro, meaning flesh; anserinus, resembling the goose; abmetu, from fear; or, freely translated, gooseflesh from fear."

The authorities, however, did not have sufficient sense of humor to cause them to extend leniency to Rosenstock.

JAPS PREFERABLE TO EUROPEANS

Washington, June 3.—With the declaration that the Japanese are infinitely preferable to the immigrants of southern Europe, the Right Rev. Charles Henry Brent, Episcopal bishop of the Philippines, expects today to visit the state department and discuss the oriental problem with Secretary Bryan. The prelate has had a crowded program since arriving in this country from the far east. Landing in New York Saturday he was the guest of co-religionists there, spent several hours in Philadelphia and came to Washington yesterday, where he was the principal speaker at the graduating exercises of a young woman's seminary.

Because of his intimate knowledge of affairs in the Philippines, it is expected that Bishop Brent will be cross-examined by officials of the war department as well as by those of the state department. It is recognized that his long years of service in the islands have given him a keen insight into the situation there.
