THE FRENCH BIRTH RATE

Some interesting remarks on the birth rate in France are made by Dr. W. H Whitehouse in his annual report as medical officer of health for the metropolitan borough of Deptford. He states:

"The serious ducline in the French birth rate, which last year showed a falling off of 32,869 births as compared with 1910, has led the Minister of Finance to appoint a commission for the purpose of investigating the causes of the decline and of suggest-

ing remedies. In emphasizing the importance of immediate action if France is to maintain her porition in the world, M. Jacques Bertillon, the eminent statistician, points out that whereas century ago 27 per cent of the population of the great European powers were French, today the proportion is only 11 per cent. Formerly French only 11 per cent. the most widely spoken language; today it is the mother tongue 100,000,000 who speak German and 130,000,000 who speak English
