

RICHFIELD WATER PRONOUNCED PURE "Reports to the effect that the water supply of Richfield is contaminated are absolutely untrue. Such was the statement made yesterday by C. F. Emery, state sanitary inspector, upon his return from Richfield, where he investigated complaints made to Dr. T. B. Beatty, secretary of the state board of health. Samples supposed to be of Richfield culinary water, when tested, did not show up well, but samples brought back by Mr. Emery tested pure to a high degree.

YOUNGSTER PITCHES REMARKABLE BALL



New York, Aug. 30.—Raleigh L. Atchison, the star twirler of 20 minor leagues, has entered the big show via Charlie Ebbetts' Brooklyn Dodgers. At that Atchison is not a recent find, for he was dug up by Larry Sutton, of Ebbetts' scouting forces 3 years ago, when he was shooting them over for Kansas City. In 1911 he was farmed out to Nashville for training, and after being recalled was sent to Montgomery team of the southern association last year. Last winter Ebbetts sent him over to the Newark Indians of the International League for further seasoning, and he has been pitching remarkable ball all summer. The youngster, he is only twenty-four, led the league in pitching records when he left the Newark team. Out of 25 games he lost but four, giving him a record of .840. The season before, while with the Montgomery aggregation he had piled up a record of .708, leading the mound artists of the Southern association. Atchison is a product of Columbus, Kan., where the hunting is mighty good, and the young left hander would rather tote a gun than anything else—except play baseball. While on the mound he wears the famous Kansas smile, no matter what the score may be or how well the batsman he faces is rated.

KEYSTONE OF "GREATEST INFIELD"



Eddie Collins, the great all around second sacker of the Philadelphia Athletics, and called the "keystone of the greatest infield ever assembled on a big league team." Like Johnny Evers, second baseman of the famous inner defense of the old club machine, Collins is credited with being the brain works of the Philadelphia quartette. He is the man who generally calls the plays, and he has started more double killings than any other man in the American league. Besides his ability in the field, the ex-Collegian is also a marvel in the offense department of the game. He ranks with the five best batters in the league and holds a similar distinction among the base-stealers.
