

## CITY INSPECTOR MAY ORDER CLEAN UP OF COURT HOUSE

Commenting on the report said to have been made by County Commissioner Moroni Skeen, that the city sanitary inspector had overstepped his bounds in the position he has taken toward the sanitary condition of the county building, Inspector George Shorten stated today that he had not extended his jurisdiction when he complained against conditions in the county court house.

"In this office we have the power to investigate conditions in any building in this city and order a cleanup, if necessary," said the inspector. When asked what will be done if the recommendations in the communication of yesterday are not followed, the inspector stated that the matter will be handled as any other case.

## IS HANDLING THE COLONIST RUSH

J. Newhouse, a representative of the passenger department of the Southern Pacific with headquarters in San Francisco, who is in Ogden assisting in the handling of the colonist business, stated today that the number of colonists passing through during the colonist period last year exceeded the number this year by 1500.

Mr. Newhouse is a great booster for California and maintains that there are still great opportunities there. He points out that most of the colonists from the east settle in California and he believes that the completion of the Panama canal will increase greatly the advantages to be enjoyed there.

He expects to be here a few days longer, although the selling date for colonist tickets expired on the tenth. Many colonists continue to pass through Ogden, however, for some time because of stopovers.

## CAMPAIGN IS BEING MADE AGAINST WORMY FRUIT

The appearance of wormy apples in a few of the stores and the peddling of the forbidden fruit in the residence district, has aroused Sanitary Inspector George Shorten and his deputies. Evidently the practice of disposing of the wormy fruit is troubling inspectors elsewhere in the state for the local health officer received a notice from the state office, requesting the local officers to enforce the state law to the letter.

The state law is strict. It declares that wormy fruit shall not be sold, given away or disposed of. The violator of the provision is subject to arrest and the fruit is to be confiscated. Inspector Shorten has orders to destroy all wormy fruit that he finds offered for sale or being disposed of.

He stated today that the inspectors have the same trouble all over every year. The good apples have been sold and the growers attempt to dispose of the culls.

Some of the farmers feed the poor apples to hogs or grind them up for cider and vinegar.

## UNSANITARY PLACES WHERE GIRLS ARE AT WORK

Editor Standard: According to your last night's article, the city sanitary inspector has not received a definite answer as to whether the cause of typhoid fever lies in the drinking water or not. Let me in the meantime advise the sanitary inspector to make a hurried visit to one of the canning factories. Do you know that in one of the plants there exists only one drinking cup for the men laborers and the girls that handle the tomatoes? That the toilet is fearfully unsanitary? Do you know that four girls were sent home with typhoid fever, and one has since died? Would it not be advisable to send a doctor's examination? Do you know that sickly people, who are not able to work, can peel fruit? The employees should be dressed in rubber aprons and rubber gloves and caps. They should be watched so that they will not eat from the fruit and throw the balance back into the basket.

Of course, we say the fruit under goes a boiling process and that kills all germs, but we live in an age that demands sanitation and let us have it if money can buy it. (Signed) MRS. L. E. BEUSCHELL.

Roberts, who presided at the meeting, said that an effort would be made to hold the Eisteddfod in Ogden. ## ESTABLISHING OF A CURB AND GUTTER DISTRICT

At the meeting of the city council last night, the report of the recorder, that the deed for the land for a right of way over the Wilcox property in Wheeler canyon, had been received, was accepted and the deed ordered placed on file. The cost of the property was \$100.

On the recommendation of Commissioner J. C. Nye, three resolutions were passed creating sidewalk district No. 124, sewer district No. 111, and for the opening of Iowa avenue.

Street payrolls in the sum of \$3,056.05, together with miscellaneous claims in the sum of \$33.46, were all allowed and ordered paid.

He was crippled with rheumatism a few days ago and was trying to get rid of that trouble at Lava Hot Springs, Idaho, when a stranger came to the hotel, told of being a wrestler and broke, and received the hospitality of Mahon. The stranger was given the rheumatism man's bedroom for one night and in payment the wrestler is alleged to have taken a shirt and a pair of valuable cuff links.

Twelve residences in the city are quarantined because of smallpox, but the typhoid situation is declared to be much better by Sanitary Inspector George Shorten. Since the outbreak of the several cases of smallpox within a few days of each other, only two additional cases have developed.
