**SLAIN WOMAN IS IDENTIFIED**

**Former Convict Beats Widow's Head to Pulp With Gas Pipe.**

Milwaukee, Wis., Oct. 20.—The identity of the woman who was strangled late last night with her own silk scarf, and her face and head beaten to a jelly by blows from a piece of gas pipe supposed to have

been wielded by a man giving his name as George Schultz, has been established as that of Mrs. Emily Will, 52, a widow who lived in the rear of 35th and Villet streets. Mrs. Will was a sister of Police Lieutenant Will Maas.

Chicago, Oct. 20.—When Captain Halpin, chief of the detective bureau, today learned of the strangling of a woman at Milwaukee last night by a man giving the name of George Schultz, he was struck with the similarity of the methods of the Milwaukee murder, to those of the missing slayer of Miss Ida Leeson, who was strangled with a piece of fish line. Her watch was pawned the day after the murder by a copper colored negro, and the search thus far has been for a man of that description.

**BODY OF ERICKSON IS FOUND ON BANK OF RIVER**

Dead from the effects of self-administered poison, the body of Carl R. Erickson, aged 35 years, who disappeared last Thursday, was found on the west bank of the Weber river between Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth streets, yesterday. While no reason for the suicidal act is indicated in a note left by the young man, dependency is believed by the relatives and friends to have been the cause.

The wife in delicate health and surrounded by four small children, was being comforted by friends at the home, 322 Thirty-second street, yesterday morning when she received the information of the finding of the body. Thoroughly alarmed because of the three days' absence of her husband, Mrs. Erickson was not prepared for the severe shock, and it is feared that serious results will follow.

The discovery of the body was made by Deputy Sheriff Joseph G. Crompton and A. W. Bingham, the latter of 253 Patterson avenue, who had spent the morning searching along the banks of the river, on the theory that Mr. Erickson had committed suicide. The body, full clothed and showing no indications of foul play, was found a few feet from the water's edge and at a point near the James ice pond. The two searchers came upon it shortly before 11 o'clock.

The sheriff's office was notified at once and several officers went to the scene. The note, written on the back of an envelope and found in one of the coat pockets, was as follows:

My name is Carl R. Erickson. My father lives in Wilson. I will ask him to take care of my family, and also Dave.

David Erickson, the person mentioned in the note, is the only brother of the deceased. In another pocket of the coat worn by the young man the officers found an empty one-ounce bottle which had contained poison. After the officers had made their investigation, the body was removed to the Lindquist undertaking rooms.

For the past several years Mr. Erickson had been employed as clerk and assistant buyer in the men's clothing department of the W. H. Wright & Sons company store. Although subject to periodical attacks of dependency, he was regarded as an efficient and reliable employe of the store. He was last seen at the store about 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon. At that time he left to go to his home for lunch, but did not go home.

Last Seen Thursday. So far as discovered by the sheriff's officers, Isaac Grow was the last person who saw him alive. That was about 6 o'clock Thursday evening, and according to Mr. Grow, there was nothing in the young man's actions at that time which would indicate contemplated suicide.

Born in this city, Mr. Erickson was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl V. Erickson, residing on Wilson lane. He would have been 35 years old today. His entire life had been spent in and near Ogden, and for several years past he had prominently identified himself with Mormon church work. At the time of his death he was first assistant superintendent of the first ward Sunday school. From 1898 until 1901 he served a three years' mission in Sweden. Besides the widow and four small children, Mr. Erickson is survived by the father, mother, one brother, David, and three sisters, Mrs. Anna Clark, Mrs. Esther Bingham and Miss Martha Erickson, all residing in Ogden.

The funeral will be held Tuesday afternoon, with services at the home of Louis K. Burton, 3355 Washington avenue, at 2 o'clock. Bishop D. H. Ensign will have charge. The body will lie in state at the Erickson home, 322 Thirty-second street, between the hours of 3 and 8 o'clock p. m. today.

**WHY THE WATER OF OGDEN SHOULD BE BOILED**

For more than a week it has been known that the city water is contaminated.

Reports from State Bacteriologist R. M. Byrnes and George W. Bailey of analyses of water samples, were received by City Physician W. H. Whalen on Saturday, October 11. It was planned to hold a board of health meeting on the following Monday, but inability of all to get together caused a postponement. The board of health meeting was not held today, either, because all the members could not get together.

At the meeting of the Medical association last week, Dr. Whalen was asked by physicians present to explain why reports of water conditions are not given to the public. The city physician stated that it has been the rule to withhold such reports until the commission could act. He explained to the physicians that in the samples analyzed, colon bacilli were found.

When colon bacilli are found it is highly probable that the water has been infected with the germs of typhoid. While the colon bacillus is not a disease-producing germ in itself, it is usually found in the discharges in connection with such diseases as typhoid fever and, when it is present in large numbers, irritation of the colon results in a disease similar to typhoid.

Following the report to Dr. Whalen by Sanitary Inspector George Shorten nearly three weeks ago, that there were numerous cases of typhoid fever in the city, a board of health meeting was called and it was recommended that water and milk samples be analyzed to discover if the water and milk supply is contaminated. Inspector Shorten delivered to R. M. Byrnes, state bacteriologist, samples and a check he also had secured by Dr. Bailey of the science department of the High school make tests. While the milk declared to be good, Dr. Byrnes found the colon bacillus in one of the water samples. Professor Bailey found that both samples were contaminated. The findings were so similar as to leave the health department in no doubt concerning the condition of Ogden's water.

When Prof. Bailey was interviewed at the high school this morning, he stated that he could give out no information concerning the report as he was working under the city physician and had already submitted his report. He said he was making some analyses of water for his personal information and that he would be pleased to give out his findings when his analyses are completed.

Mr. Bailey stated that when the samples were brought to him he was told to see if the samples contained typhoid germs. This, he said, is amusing for the reason that there have been but three or four times when typhoid germs have been isolated from water. The presence of the typhoid producing organism is usually indicated by associated bacteria.

When asked about the colon bacillus, the professor stated that when such organisms are found, it is highly probable that human excreta is present. When such germs are found in water, it is to be supposed that typhoid germs are also in the same water for the two would probably come from the same source.

When Dr. Whalen was asked why the seriousness of the report resulted in the information being given to the physician, instead of being made generally public, the doctor explained the circumstances.

"I was at the meeting of the Weber County Medical association and I was asked why reports had been suppressed. In justice to myself and because I believed that the physicians should know the water conditions, I explained my position."

When pressed for a remedy for the situation, Dr. Whalen stated that the only thing to do is to protect the water shed from contamination which is a big job and not practical at the present time. His next suggestion is to move the intake in Wheeler canyon to a higher point and to use only Wheeler Creek and Cold Water canyon water. "Ogden river water should not be permitted to run into the city reservoir for the reason that it is the most contaminated," he said.

In the meantime the people should boil the water used for drinking purposes.


