## AUSTRIA TO PASS IMMIGRATION BILL

Vienna, Aus., Oct. 21.—The Austrian government, as the result of recent developments in the immigration traffic from Austria to the United States and Canada, introduced into the lower house of the Austrian parliament a bill prohibiting "an emigration likely to have an adverse on military recruiting in Austria."

The bill introduced today also prohibits "emigration calculated to promote the white slave trade."

## FIRE CHIEF ISSUES A FOLDER OF FIRE NOTES

Fire Chief A. B. Canfield has had printed a number of folders containing information which, if followed, will do much toward preventing fires. In the folders, which were issued today, is the location of the fire alarm boxes, information as to how an alarm should be sent in and a series of "don'ts" for the prevention of fires. The hints on how to prevent fires and what to do in case of fires follow:

A little fire may be quickly extinguished; if neglected, rivers cannot quench.

Fires result from accidents, carelessness, spontaneous combustion or design; all of which can be prevented.

Keep your house, store or factory clean.

Never allow rubbish, such as paper, rags, cobwebs, old clothing, boxes, etc., to accumulate in closets and in unused rooms.

Never fill your coal-oil lamps when burning, after dark, or near an open fire.

Never run stove pipes through wooden partition or through the roof without proper protection, have metal cap in all unused flue openings.

Never allow your furnace, steam or hot water pipes to come in contact with wood.

Never put up gas brackets so they can be swung against the wood window casings or curtains.

Never put ashes in wooden receptacles or about your premises.

Never keep matches in any but metal or earthen safes, and when you light one never throw it on the floor.

Never allow smoking in proximity to inflammable merchandise or materials.

Never take an open light to examine gas meter or into a closet.

Never read in bed by candle or lamp light, as this is very dangerous.

Never close up your place of business before going over the entire premises to see that all fires and lights are safe or extinguished.

Never forget that carelessness and negligence are the cause of nearly all the fires.

Never forget to have pails of water near at hand for use in case of emergency.

When at a theatre, motion picture show or where there is a large assembly of persons, look around when you get seated, choose the nearest exit to your seat.

In case of fire keep cool, walk to exit, not run. Do not try to beat your neighbor to the street. Panics are caused by rushes; help make these places panic proof by following the above suggestions. Never cry out the word "Fire" in a crowded hall or building, as this is a criminal offence.

Red lights denote exits.

In case of fire, keep cool; notify the fire department at once.

How to call the fire department by telephone:

Call telephone central, ask for the fire department, when answered by the fire department give location of the fire thus: Fire on — street between — street and — street or avenue as the case may be.

How to send in a fire alarm from fire alarm box. Break glass, open door, pull down hook once and let go. The key is always in lock on front of box.

Locate the nearest fire alarm box and make a note of it here.

The nearest fire alarm box is: No. —, corner of — street and — avenue.

Take no chances where there is any evidence of fire, but call for the fire department.

Visit the fire station, ask any questions; the members of the department will take pleasure in explaining.

Know the workings of the fire department and how they work; then you will know how yourself, and property will be protected.

### CONTEST ON AT VERNAL

Vernal, Utah, Oct. 20.—A second ticket was launched here when citizens of Vernal who do not favor the People's ticket met at the courthouse and nominated a mayor and four councilmen. They christened it the "Citizens ticket." The meeting was attended mostly by those who booted at the People's ticket convention last week, declaring that the present mayor and council had been renominated.

The nominations were as follows: Mayor, O. J. Bracken; councilmen, John N. Davis, Reuben Calder, Charles DeMolay and Irvin Eaton.

The People's convention, which met last week, nominated as follows: Mayor, E. D. Samuels; councilmen, Isaac Burton, L. H. Woodard, J. K. Bullock and Leslie Ashton. A most significant fact is that while the People's ticket is practically Gentile, all but one of the councilmen of the Citizens ticket are members of the Mormon church.

The fight promises to be a warm one. Each side has about the same number of supporters and it promises to be one of the most interesting political battles ever fought in Vernal.

A great many people are confusing the coming city election with the liquor election, which does not come up until June, 1914.

### EL KALAH MEMBERS TO HOLD CONVENTION

Salt Lake, Oct. 21.—Members of El Kalah temple, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine of Salt Lake City, will observe Halloween with the celebration of their semi-annual ceremonial in the Masonic temple in this city. There are more than 700 El Kalah nobles, of whom 350 are residents of Salt Lake City. They have made extensive plans for a ceremonial that will excel any of past years. In addition to a large percentage of the members of the temple, it is expected that there will be visitors from Colorado, Nevada, Idaho, Wyoming and Montana. About forty novices will be guided in their first walk across the burning sands, as a part of the program of the ceremonial.

A movement is already under way to bring Shriners of all the states west of and including Colorado and Wyoming to Devil's Slide for a celebration and ceremonial session to be

held in August of next year. It is estimated that in the neighborhood of 10,000 men will visit here and go from here to the famous camping ground on that occasion. Devil's Slide, where such celebrations have been held on numerous occasions, is noted throughout the country as an ideal place for such solemn meetings. It is located in Weber canyon, southeast from Ogden.

### CRAFTS LAID AT REST.

American Fork, Oct. 20.—Funeral services for Elmer Crafts, who died Saturday were held from the Second ward L. D. S. meeting house this morning, commencing at 10 o'clock. Bishop Joseph H. Storrs conducting the services. There was a good attendance of friends of the family, who had turned out to pay their last tribute of respect to the departed young man. A musical selection was rendered by Professor Hopkins on the violin; and solos were sung by Miss Byrle Featherstonem and F. L. Hickman. The speakers were President James H. Clarke and Dr. P. M. Kelly. The body was taken to Cedar Fort for interment.

## JUDGE LOVETT COMING BACK

Salt Lake, Oct. 21.—When Judge Lovett arrived in Salt Lake on a special train yesterday morning he only had a few hours, which were devoted to conferences with railroad officials located here. But when a committee from the Commercial club told the railroad magnate that there were several things the business men of Salt Lake wanted to discuss with him he quickly replied that he would find time to stop off on his return from the coast.

Judge Lovett said he was making the trip west to find out many things were out in the mountains and on the coast. He said that he was well satisfied with what he had seen and expressed a willingness to hear what the men of Utah had to say to him. When Will G. Farrell, as spokesman for the committee, asked Judge Lovett to stop off here on his return, he said:

"Well, I haven't much time; I don't know whether I can do it on this trip or not. Yes," he added, "I will find time. I don't know just when it will be, but I'll come. I'll wire you as soon as I can fix the date." Thus did the genial railroad head indicate his interest in Utah.

could not tell just when he would be here on his return, it is probable that he will be here within a week at least. He will meet former Senator W. A. Clark, president of the Salt Lake Route, in Los Angeles, and will hold a conference with him. Then Senators Clark and also H. C. Nutt, general manager of the Salt Lake Route, will return with him to this city.

A. L. Mohler, president of the Oregon Short Line and the Union Pacific, with headquarters in Omaha, and B. L. Winchell, director of traffic for the Union Pacific system, came here with Judge Lovett and continued with him to Los Angeles. From here, W. H. Bancroft, vice president and general manager for the Oregon Short Line, and Fred H. Knickerhocker, assistant general manager, went with the party. H. E. Van Housen, superintendent of the Salt Lake Route, accompanied the party as far as Caliente, Nevada. The special train carrying the officials left Salt Lake at 11 o'clock yesterday forenoon.

### CHIEF OF POLICE GIVEN SENTENCE IN JAIL

Salt Lake, Oct. 21.—One day in the county jail and a fine of \$100 was the sentence imposed on the chief of police yesterday morning by Justice of the Peace Harry S. Harper for refusal to obey an order of the court, for which he was adjudged in contempt. Immediately following his sentence, the police chief was taken into custody by H. P. Myton, deputy sheriff, who took his prisoner before the supreme court, where an application had been made for a writ of habeas corpus.

The courts of the state are divided as to whether the writ should be issued in a contempt case and the supreme court probably will not give its opinion in the matter for several days. Pending the decision, the attorneys for the chief filed an appeal bond with Justice Harper. By the filing of the bond, the chief was permitted to go on his own recognizance on his

promise to surrender himself to the sheriff when so ordered.

The contempt proceedings grew out of the refusal of the chief of police to obey an order of release on bond issued by Justice Harper in the case of C. W. Whitman, a negro, charged with violation of the state drug law. The order of release was issued by Justice Harper September 7.

## JOINT FUNERAL SERVICES HELD

Emperor and Family Mourn With Germany for Victims of Zeppelin Disaster.

Berlin, Oct. 21.—Impressive joint funeral services were held today over the bodies of twenty-three of the twenty-eight victims of Friday's disaster to the Zeppelin airship at Johannisthal. The emperor and his sons were present, accompanied by the empress and the crown princess, while Count Zeppelin and about a thousand officers of the army and navy also attended.

Prince Eitel Fritz, while coming from Potsdam in his automobile to attend the funeral ceremony, struck a five-year-old boy with the wheel of his machine while the child was crossing the street. The boy was seriously injured.

### GRAVE DISORDERS IN PORTUGAL.

Madrid, Oct. 21.—Rumors of grave political disorders in Portugal are current here. No definite news of what has occurred can be obtained owing to the Portuguese news censorship.
