NO HEADQUARTERS TO BE ESTABLISHED BY DR. ROWE

There is to be independent campaigning and the elimination of excessive expenditures of money to get people to the registration offices and to the polls on election day. However all the political candidates are looking to their fences. Yesterday afternoon, at a meeting of men representing strong business interests, Dr. Rowe, candidate for mayor, was offered as strong a political organization as ever existed in the city and money to conduct the campaign on the old line of political battles, but he refused absolutely to accept and he stated to his friends that he considered such a campaign unfair. His friends advised him that

he was making a mistake, as campaigns are generally won through an organized force which calls for the expenditure of considerable money.

Today Dr. Rowe stated to a Standard reporter that he does not expect to have headquarters and that he will hire no one to aid him in his campaign, nor will he pay for any votes.

"There will be no hired man in my camp," he said emphatically, "and the matter of voting for me will be left entirely to the judgment of the people on election day. I don't believe in big expenditures in campaigns, as it is a form of bribery and furthermore I don't think the people are so cheap. Whatever aid I get from friends in this campaign will be given voluntarily and without solicitation on my part. It is my honest judgment that campaign funds should be eliminated. I don't think I will have special headquarters and I know of no one who will especially manage my campaign. I guess I will be the only manager."

Mayor Fell's headquarters are open today but there is little being done except to get registration lists complete and make minor arrangements for next week, which will be the heavy part of the campaign. Mr. Fell has a strong organization and he will fight for every inch of ground until election day. The executive committee of Mr. Fell's organization consists of David S. Cook, chairman and manager, George Halverson, J. M. Forsyth, J. C. Nye, James McCracken and Joseph E. Evans, secretary.

Manager Cook stated this morning that it is the desire of Mr. Fell and the executive committee to conduct a fair campaign in every respect and that the other candidates could not suggest a higher plane of campaigning than Mr. Fell would accept. He said that he did not expect to hire any rigs or automobiles for the next registration day and that, if any were used, they would be offered gratuitously. He also said that a good many friends are offering Mr. Fell assistance in the campaign.

"You can take it from me," he said, "that we will be ready to eliminate any campaign evils that may exist and I am of the opinion that all the candidates are of the same frame of mind. The registration is already heavy, according to my calculations, and it is quite certain that most of those who have failed to register up to this time will go to the registration places next Tuesday and place their names on the books, which will insure a heavy vote on election day." The other candidate state that they will individually conduct their campaigns and make no unusual efforts on registration day to get the voters out, and that on election day no special efforts will be put forth.

There is some talk from outside sources of combinations being formed between candidates, notwithstanding the statements of candidates to the contrary, but at present there seems to be little ground for the rumor.

DESPERATE FELLOWS SENT TO PRISON FROM OGDEN

William Martin, Harvey McSwiggin and William Bump, the three desperadoes sentenced to indefinite terms in the state penitentiary following their daring daylight holdup of the Biel Meat Market and the Exchange saloon last July, added to their reputations as desperate men last week when a guard at the state penitentiary found in their cells a complete outfit for an escape. It is said that had the men been given the liberty of the prison yard, they could have succeeded in getting over the walls.

The story of the attempt to escape was brought from Salt Lake yesterday by Ogdentites who visited the penitentiary and were shown the outfit taken from the cells of the men. The three have now been placed in solitary confinement.

The equipment consisted of several feet of rope that had been made by braiding ordinary wrapping twine, several sections of broom stick that could be joined together quickly to make a long pole and some reinforced steel clamps.

From the twine, the men had made a strong enough rope to sustain the weight of a heavy man. In addition they had made some smaller cords, to be used, it is thought, for tying the guards. To the ends of the heavier rope had been attached ingeniously devised clutches that would grip the top of the wall. Broomsticks had been cut into lengths that could be concealed but the sections had been arranged so that they could be joined together making a rod of sufficient length to attach the clamps of the rope to the top of the wall.

From all appearances, the three were prepared to wait until an opportunity was given them for acting. They had not been allowed the liberty of the jail yard but it is thought that they were planning a break whenever such liberty was given them. From now on the three will be carefully watched.
