PAVING ON LINCOLN DELAYED UNTIL SPRING

A. A. Clark of Salt Lake, who has the contract for the concrete paving on Lincoln avenue, between Twenty-sixth and Thirtieth streets, does not expect to begin the work until spring and the delay is agreed to by the engineering department and J. C. Nye, superintendent of streets.

The reason for not beginning work immediately is that the job cannot be completed before freezing weather sets in and it is considered best to not cut up the avenue with excavations until a time when the job can be finished without interruption. The city engineer states that there are certain underground pipes that should be laid before paving is done and that it will require considerable time to do that work.

W. H. CHEVERS GIVEN MOST IMPORTANT PROMOTION

Information was received in Ogden today of a reorganization of the freight and passenger business of the Union Pacific system to take effect November 1. W. H. Chevers, at present freight agent, is to be general agent of this district in charge of both freight and passenger business. He will probably have his office in the present city ticket office of the Union Pacific system.

Although it is stated that the reorganization is strictly a local affair and is to be made because of the heavy business in Ogden, the rumor has spread that the move is but one of the many which are contemplated on the Union Pacific before the first of the year.

The promotion comes to Mr. Chevers because of well known fitness, wide knowledge of the railroad traffic business and the general satisfaction he has given shippers during the years he has been district freight agent with his headquarters in Ogden. Mr. Chevers has been in the railroad business 33 years.

It is expected that the move on the part of the Union Pacific system will result in a number of new positions to be filled by employees who must make their home in Ogden. The change is looked upon as another indication that the railroad company realizes the importance of this city in relation to the railroad map.


