

# SHORTAGE OF FOOD AND FUEL

## General Strike of Coal Miners and Dockers Brings Hardship on New Zealanders.

Wellington, N. Z., Oct. 31.—A shortage of food and fuel, with its accompanying privations for the poorer classes, is commencing to be felt throughout New Zealand as a result of a general strike of coal miners and dockers.

Work has ceased in most trades in every port of New Zealand. In Wellington and Auckland, the two principal cities, continued rioting has brought about the landing of blue jackets from British warships to assist in preserving order. The blue jackets are assigned primarily to protect the men engaged in loading fruit on vessels at the docks and to see that passengers are allowed to embark or land from steamers without molestation.

Federation Fights Employers. The struggle which has led to this serious state of affairs is a trial of strength between the employers and the federation of labor. The latter organization is not registered under the provision of the compulsory arbitration act passed in 1902, by the terms of which any persons inciting workmen to strike or any employers ordering a lockout without first going to arbitration, are liable to severe penalties.

The labor upheaval begun with a strike of shipwrights several weeks ago. The men demanded higher wages, improved working conditions and recognition of their union. The dockers and miners shortly afterward laid down their tools in sympathy, and other trades followed their example until a large proportion of the organized labor of the dominion has ceased work.

## PAYS CAR FARE AFTER SEVEN YEARS

Middletown, N. Y., Oct. 31.—A remarkable instance of a conscience-stricken woman who failed to pay for a ride on a trolley car six or seven years ago is revealed in a letter just received by D. C. McMonagle, president of the local transit company. The letter, from a woman in the northern part of the state, whose name is withheld, read:

"Enclosed find ten cents in stamps for car fare. Some time ago I rode twice on the trolley, when the conductor failed to take my fare, perhaps six or seven years ago. It has come back to my mind, and I therefore send it to you now, and please pardon me for not doing so before."

## HERCULEAN EFFORTS TO CLEAR SLIDE

Washington, Oct. 31.—The task of opening a way through Cucaracha slide, the sole remaining obstacle to navigation through the Panama canal, has been carried on as "rush work" since the blowing up of the

Gambosa dike, according to a dispatch received today from the isthmus. The engineers have been putting forth Herculean efforts to clear the half mile obstruction but the work is often undone over night by a slumping back of the material removed.

A ton and a half of dynamite was exploded October 19 without any substantial increase in the flow of water across the dam. Since then three shifts of men, working eight hours each continuously, have been trying to create a channel.

The recent sharp rise in the level of Gatun lake, however, has increased the size of the ditch, so that now seven million cubic feet of water daily is passing over the slide and sufficient water now has been admitted to permit the big steam dredges to enter the cut and operate on the earth barrier.

## EXPERIMENT WITH BREECHES BUOY

Washington, Oct. 31.—Experiment with the breeches buoy to increase the life saving operations of revenue cutters have been begun by the revenue cutter service at South Baltimore. Lieutenant Camden, ordnance officer of the service, has experimented with the line throwing possibilities of six pounder rifled cannon in place of the usual small gun used for this purpose at present. The small gun will throw a line-carrying projectile about 600 yards, and a six pounder would greatly increase this distance. The small gun has several other disadvantages not encountered in the use of six-pounders.

The experiments this far have convinced Lieutenant Camden that the change is practicable. The only difficulties so far met, he thinks, can be overcome by practice. The innovation, officers believe, will be invaluable in life saving work in cases such as marked the destruction of the late ill-fated Volturno.

## ESCAPING GAS CAUSES A DEATH

New York, Oct. 31.—Florence Haliday, a governess in the family of Maurice Brill, a prominent clothing merchant, was found dead and a man supposed to have been her fiancé, was found unconscious, in a rooming house where the young woman lived, late last night from what is supposed to have been the accidental escape of gas. It was understood at the house that the couple were engaged to be married shortly. Both were clad for the street as though both about to leave the house where they were overcome by the gas escaping from a stove. The man known only at the house as Mr. Price, was in the Flower hospital today in a critical condition.

## BID FOR CARRYING MAILS 3000 MILES

Washington, Oct. 31.—A bid for carrying the mails three thousand miles in the depth of an Arctic winter over the mountains of northern Alaska, when the snow lies so deep there is scarcely a bottom, was received today by the postoffice department.
