PROVIDING WORK ON A FARM FOR BOYS IN VACATION

With an address by the Rev. P. A. Simpkin of Salt Lake, on the subject of "Our duty in regard to the declining moral standard," the two days' convention of the Associated Boys' clubs of Utah, which has been held at the Baptist church, was brought to a close.

Rev. Simpkin's talk impressed all the workers present, with its careful consideration of the many phases of the question. The moral to it all was that the way to better standards of morality lay in the improvement of the home life and a deeper regard for the religious life.

Yesterday afternoon, following the inspection of the State Industrial school, a most able address was given by Dr. C. A. Wherry of Salt Lake City on the subject of sex instruction. His treatment of the question so impressed the delegates that a motion was made and carried to appoint a committee to take up the question with the state board of education and later, if necessary, with the state legislature at its next session, with a view to getting laws passed to include sex education in the curriculum of the schools.

The close inspection of the state school and the explanation of methods used there to redeem the inmates, given the visitors by Superintendent Gowans, brought forcibly before all the necessity of useful service in the life of a boy or girl, if they would become useful members of a community and that there should be a more definite system arranged by the state officials to see that this training was more general. A proposal, in this regard, was made that vacation work be provided for the boys by the states, counties, cities or school districts.

One of the visiting delegates made the suggestion that a tract of land be secured and the boys be given employment there during the vacation period, under the instruction of experienced agriculturists.

Dr. Gowans also addressed his guests while they were at the school, discussing "The Problem and Cure of Delinquency." He contended that the problem was really a parent problem and that delinquency was usually found to be the result of a lack of proper care for the boys by their parents. That this was true he proved by stating that 95 per cent of the boys in the State School were there because of laxity in their home training.

Later in the afternoon the delegates were taken to the Congregational "Country Club" and explained to them this phase of the work that is being done by the local church.

At the business meeting the following officers were elected: President, Rev. Paul Jones of Logan; vice president, Dr. C. A. Wherry of Salt Lake; secretary, treasurer, Rev. G. F. Rasmussen of Ogden; and executive secretary in charge of boys' club work, Homer L. Holmington of the Salt Lake Y. M. C. A. A publicity secretary was also appointed and the creation of the "Boys' Welfare Association of Utah" from the "Associated Boys' clubs" was consummated. This change, it is believed, will broaden the scope of the workers and the work of handling the "boy problem" will be more actively taken up.

WOODMEN OF MANY CAMPS ARE TO BE ENTERTAINED

Weber Camp 74, W. O. W. will act as hosts tonight to the three camps from Salt Lake and the camps from Murray, Bountiful and Kayville. The occasion is in the nature of a house-warming for the benefit of the neighbors from the south, whom it was impossible to accommodate at the time of the formal opening, on account of the large number of home folks who were taken care of at that time.

The delegation from the south will arrive at 8 o'clock over the Hamberger and will be met by the local membership headed by the drill team in uniform. Automobiles will be provided to accommodate the officers from the visiting camps. The membership has been asked to be on hand to meet the visitors on their arrival and to act as an escort from the depot to the hall.

An interesting program has been prepared. The principal address of the evening will be given by Judge J. A. Howell who is a member of the local camp.

Refreshments will be served at the close of the regular program, and the balance of the evening, until the time of departure, will be given over to informal visiting.

The visitors will travel on a special train, and it is expected that there will be between 300 and 400.

OVER TWO MILLIONS PLEDGED IN 3 DAYS

New York, N. Y., Nov. 13.—The third day of the two weeks' campaign for \$4,000,000 for the Young Men's and Young Women's Christian associations closed with \$2,150,787 of the amount pledged. Total subscriptions yesterday amounted to \$91,946, of which \$28,000 was sent by Coleman DuPont. Anonymous contributions of \$28,000 were announced.
