



New York, Nov. 17.—Darkness of moving picture theaters has proved such a cover for annoying flirtations that Magistrate Campbell, in night court last night, sentenced to the workhouse for ten days a young man who had spoken to three young women sitting in front of him at a "movie show." The magistrate declared that "this moving picture mashing done under cover of darkness cannot be tolerated for an instant," and said he would deal severely with prisoners brought before him on such a charge.

Newark, N. J., Nov. 17.—The Newark baseball club, winner of the International league pennant last summer, met today for the election of a president and the selection of spring training grounds. It was reported that there was a strong sentiment among the club members for the election of Charles H. Ebbetts, Jr., son of the president of the Brooklyn National league club, to head the Newark club next year, although George L. Solomon was up for reelection as president.

TICKET SHARPS TO BE FRUSTRATED

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 17.—By a change in the manner of marking the tickets for this year's Harvard-Yale football game, the Harvard Athletic authorities hope to be able to prevent speculation. Each ticket is stamped with the name of the applicant and he alone will be allowed to use it. If a ticket is found in the possession of a speculator, it will be confiscated, and the one to whom it was issued will be deprived of the right to apply for tickets to future games.
The Harvard Athletic association today began the distribution of 27,000 tickets to Harvard graduates and undergraduates.

MEXICAN MINISTER LEAVES FOR PARIS

Vera Cruz, Nov. 17.—Manuel Garza Aldape, who recently resigned the ministership of the Interior in the cabinet, arrived here this morning from Mexico City and boarded the steamer, Espagne, accompanied by his wife and children. He was escorted to the quay by the local officials.
In reply to questions he would only say he was proceeding to Paris to take up his duties as Mexican minister to France.

FERDINAND MAY GIVE UP THRONE

Abdication of King of Bulgaria Predicted—Prays at Ancestors' Graves.

SURRENDER OPPOSED

Germans Offer Little Encouragement to Monarch in His Crisis.

Berlin, Nov. 17.—King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, who arrived today in Coburg, is passing through such a crisis, according to well informed circles in Coburg and Berlin, that his abdication of the throne in favor of his son is possible and even probable.

The king is residing incognito at the palace in Coburg. He spent this morning in prayer at the graves of his ancestors.

Austrian statesmen are doing their utmost to discourage his proposed surrender of the throne because they consider the young crown prince Boris likely to be influenced by the element friendly to Russia.

No Encouragement for King.
King Ferdinand, at the same time, is receiving little encouragement in Germany. Emperor William and the German government have expressed themselves openly as friendly to Greece. It is understood that when King Ferdinand expressed a desire to come to Berlin, he was given an intimation that such a visit would be useless.

Ferdinand is the youngest son of the late Prince Augustus of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha and was elected prince of Bulgaria on July 7, 1887. He declared himself king in 1908 and was recognized by the powers. The Bulgarian legation here has issued a denial of the reports that he intends to quit the throne but the denial is regarded here as merely perfunctory.

The negotiations between William Bayard Hale, unofficial agent of the Washington administration, and General Carranza were believed here today to have reached a crucial stage. Both Mr. Hale and Francisco Escudero, minister of exterior relations in the Carranza cabinet and with whom Hale conferred last night, intimated that the exchanges had been of a most friendly and satisfactory character. BORDER MEETING IS AT CRUCIAL POINT

Nogales, Sonora, Mex., Nov. 17.—Retaliation for the execution of Constitutional prisoners put to death by Mexican federals was advanced today as a possible explanation of the action of General Villa at Juarez in ordering the execution of at least two federal prisoners yesterday. At General Carranza's headquarters it was denied that specific orders for the Juarez executions had been sent from here, but the same informant thought it possible that General Villa acted under instructions given several months ago by General Carranza. That order, it was stated, had directed that no federal prisoner below the grade of captain be executed. NATIONAL HORSE SHOW UNDER WAY

New York, Nov. 17.—After the warming up session of Saturday the National Horse Show got under way today for six days and nights of real business. Hackneys had their innings today and they appeared in far greater number than in the National Horse show of twenty years ago. Where nearly every other breed has lost ground these descendants of the ancient English trotting horse have made headway until they now dominate the heavy harness classes.

STRONG FLEET IS ON MEXICAN COAST

Chicago, Nov. 17.—A strong fleet of American warships and an army of marines already is guarding the coast of Mexico to protect United States citizens, according to Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels, who arrived in Chicago today to inspect the naval training station at Lake Forest, Ill.
"We have seven battleships, one cruiser and one gunboat on the east coast of Mexico and three cruisers and two gun boats on the west coast," said Mr. Daniels. "The ships carry 7000 marines and sailors and I think the force is ample to protect American citizens. I don't wish to talk about the Mexican situation."

WOMEN INTERCEDE FOR MRS. WAKEFIELD

Chicago, Nov. 17.—Police women, under the direction of Major M. L. C. Funkhouser, second deputy police superintendent, are conducting a quiet investigation of Chicago's alleged dance hall evils. It became known today. The investigation has been in progress for nearly two weeks and probably will result in the introduction of at least one ordinance regulating new style dancing at tonight's meeting of the council.
Alderman Pretzel announced that he is preparing an ordinance to limit the tango dance. The proposed ordi-

PRES. SMITH AND HIS LIFE'S WORK

Salt Lake, Nov. 17.—Thomas Hull, member of the general board of the Mutual Improvement association, and Hugh J. Cannon, president of Liberty state, were speakers at the regular services at the Tabernacle yesterday afternoon. In their talks they criticized those who are assailing the Mormon church and its doctrines.
Mr. Hull, in opening, gave a brief history of the life of President Joseph F. Smith and told of the early struggles of the church for an existence in the face of terrible persecution. Mr. Hull said that if the teachings and doctrines of the Mormon church had not been inspired it would have been impossible for the church to exist and grow from poverty to wealth and power as it had done in the eighty-three years of its life.
"The seventy-fifth anniversary of the birth of President Joseph F. Smith passed but two or three days since and it seems only fitting and proper that some word should be spoken concerning him and his life's work," said Mr. Hull in opening his discourse. "All of our people are acquainted with him and know of his life's struggle. He was born amid poverty and distress at a time when the church was passing through one of the darkest seasons of its history. Then it seemed that all the powers of the earth were combined to destroy it and his early life was spent among persecution and poverty.
"Joseph F. Smith is essentially a product of Mormonism and one of its best products. Before he was 3 years old his father was made a

FORESTS MUST COMPOSE ONE-THIRD OF DOMAIN

Washington, Nov. 17.—From one-fifth to one-third of the United States must be devoted to forests if proper stream-flow and the prevention of the "washing" of the soil is to be brought about, in the opinion of a special convention of the national Conservation congress tomorrow. This announcement was made today by the federal forest service.
"Forests must be protected," the committee sets forth, "not so much in localities that already suffer from lack of moisture, as in regions which lie in the path of prevailing winds
