NEBEKER IS TO BE NAMED MARSHAL

Salt Lake, Dec. 6.—Aquilla Nebeker will be named United States marshal for Utah. This was regarded as certain last night when friends of Mr. Nebeker received private wires from Washington informing them that the

department of justice would today send Mr. Nebeker's name to the White House with the recommendation that Mr. Nebeker be appointed marshal.

As soon as the currency bill passes the senate it is regarded as certain that the president will send to the senate the names of Aquilla Nebeker for United States marshal for Utah and W. W. Ray for United States district attorney for Utah. It is understood that the Utah senators will attempt to oppose the confirmation of Mr. Ray on the ground that the term of Hiram E. Booth, present United States attorney, has not yet expired, but that there will be no opposition to the confirmation of Mr. Nebeker's appointment.

The appointment of Mr. Nebeker, which is now regarded as certain, will bring to an end the long fight that has been waged among the Utah Democrats over the marshaling appointment. Mr. Nebeker was originally recommended for the place by the Democratic state committee, but W. R. Wallace, national committeeman, opposed this appointment, and recommended George A. Storrs for the place. After several months of controversy another meeting of the state committee was held, at which the members of the committee who attended the meeting rescinded the previous action of the committee as announced with Mr. Wallace in recommending Mr. Storrs for the place.

In the meantime Judge O. W. Powers of Salt Lake, George Whitmore of Nephi and other staunch Nebeker supporters carried the fight to Washington, and Mr. Nebeker himself visited Washington. The department of justice made an exhaustive investigation into the merits of the candidates and the strength of their endorsements and finally decided upon Nebeker for the place.

Mr. Nebeker has long been one of the leaders of his party in Utah. His home is in Laketown, Rich county, Utah. He was for several years a member of the state senate and at one time president of the senate. As acting governor of Utah he created a sensation by an attempt to appoint a Democrat to fill a vacancy in the United States senate.

The term of office of James H. Anderson, present United States marshal, has already expired and it is probable that Mr. Nebeker will succeed to the place soon after January 1.

NORMAN TANNER LOSES HIS LIFE

Idaho Falls, Idaho, Dec. 15.—J. W. Dill, architect, of this city, received word from the postmaster at Jackson Hole, Wyo., Friday night, stating that Norman Tanner, a brother of Mrs. Dill, had been killed while getting out timber for a house, somewhere up in the mountains. Details were entirely lacking, owing presumably to the inaccessibility of the place and the depth of the snow in that region.

Last night a long distance telephone message was received from the same official asking what to do with the body, to which the answer was sent that Mrs. Dill would come immediately. She left last night, but owing to the necessary staging from Tetonia to the station on the Boise-Yellowstone branch of the Oregon Short Line he is twenty or more miles from Jackson Hole, and across the divide, it will be several days before she can be heard from, as sleigh communication is uncertain at this time of year. Tanner was 22 years old, a native of Menan, and unmarried.

SERIOUSLY HURT WHILE INSPECTING TIMBERS

Bingham, Dec. 15.—While inspecting the timbers in a bulkhead on the 700-foot level of the Utah Apex mine yesterday, Silas Brimhall, 29 years of age, a hoist engineer, fell seventy-five feet down a chute, and was probably fatally injured. Several ribs were torn from the spine and he was badly cut about the face and head.

He was attended at the mine by Dr. J. F. Flynn and later was removed to St. Mark's hospital in Salt Lake. Brimhall is a nephew of C. Brimhall, a shift boss at the Utah Apex and had been taken from his regular duties as hoist engineer and assigned to duty checking timber used in placing bulkheads in the mine. The accident occurred between the ninth and tenth stope on the 700-foot level.


