CONDUCTOR DIES WHILE ON DUTY

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 13.—While driving his locomotive 55 miles an hour yesterday, George S. Perry, engineer of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul's fast overland train, the Olympian, dropped dead of heart disease at his throttle. Death occurred soon after Perry had won a race against a rival train on a rival road which parallels the Milwaukee's tracks near Easton. Just before the roads begin to climb the steep grade up the east slope of the Cascade mountains. After Perry's train had passed its rival and had gone through Easton at full speed, W. A. Holton, the fireman, saw that the engineer was dead. Holton drove the train to Laconia on the west slope of the range, where another engineer ran the train into Seattle.

Perry was one of the oldest men in the employ of the Milwaukee, having been in the cab more than forty years. During that time he had never figured in a wreck. He was 63 years old yesterday and his friends had planned a surprise party for his homecoming. Many of them did not know of his death until they went last night to the railway station to accompany him home to the birthday festivities.

EXPOSITION FUNDS FOR SAN FRANCISCO

Apportionment of the funds between San Francisco and San Diego and the selection of committees to have charge of the respective exhibits were the principal items of business transacted yesterday by the Utah exposition commission, which held a lengthy session in the office of Governor Spry. The selection of a permanent secretary to the commission was deferred, probably for several months. For the present L. A. Merrill will act as secretary, and the commission granted him permission to engage an office assistant until a permanent secretary is named.

It was finally decided that 60 per cent of all funds up to \$75,000 will be used at San Francisco and 40 per cent at San Diego. All money above \$75,000 will go to the San Francisco exhibit, according to the decision of the commission. The state appropriated \$50,000 and the commission hopes to raise an additional \$35,000 or \$40,000 from county taxation. Each county has been asked to levy a special assessment of 2 cents on every \$100 worth of taxable property in 1914 and again in 1915. The majority of the county commissioners have responded so favorably to the request of the commission that the members felt warranted in going ahead on the assumption that such a fund would be raised. The commission delegated John Q. Critchlow and Dr. H. M. Rowe to visit the commissioners of Weber county and discuss the project with them.

Buildings will be constructed at both the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco and the San Diego fair. With about a dozen architects competing, the commission appointed Cannon & Fetzner as the official architects of the Utah exhibitions. They will prepare the plans for Utah's buildings.

Committees were appointed to have charge of the exhibits as follows: At San Francisco—Glen Miller, Dr. G. B. Foutz, D. S. Spencer and George Austin, all of Salt Lake. At San Diego—Lewis A. Merrill of Salt Lake, J. Will Knight of Provo, Dr. H. M. Rowe of Ogden, and John Q. Critchlow of Salt Lake.

These members of the commission will be in full charge of the exhibits, under the direction of the commission. Tentative plans for buildings will be drawn up at once by Cannon & Fetzner, according to Lewis T. Cannon, senior member of the firm.

STRIKE LEADERS DIFFER IN OPINION

Tacoma, Wash., Jan. 13.—Differences of opinion about how to run the strike now on against the Tacoma Smelting company developed here today between Thomas Reilly, organizer of the Western Federation of Miners, and members of the Industrial Workers of the World.

"Industrial Workers and Socialists will not be allowed in the camps of the strikers," said Reilly today. "We are going to win this strike on our merits, through peace and orderly tactics."

Reilly took district issue with exhortations delivered two nights ago by Joseph Ertor, an Industrial Worker, who was active in the Lawrence, Mass., textile strike.

The present strike is against the extension of a nine-hour day to ten hours with no increase in pay. The men are unorganized, but expect a charter from the Western Federation of Miners.

FICTITIOUS NAMES GIVEN TO BUREAU

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 13.—Investigation by the police into reports that many of the 1,422 unemployed married men who are registered for work at the city's labor bureau and kitchen, are listed fraudulently, showed today that 35 per cent of this preferred class have given fictitious addresses, are not married or have no homes in San Francisco.

The police found a number of addresses were vacant lots. Others were stores.

One man gave the address of a capitalist. Ten were found to be property owners, and one had two lots and a growing family, the members of which were earning money.

The registration of the idle men carried with it free food until work could be provided. The lure of free food was too strong for many single men who registered as married men with homes here. Fifteen hundred men were ordered to work here today in various parts of the city in public squares and parks, street repairing and similar tasks. The money for their pay was obtained by the special relief committee of one hundred, which made a general appeal to the public for funds.

REDUCTIONS IN WOOL GOODS ANNOUNCED

New York, N. Y., Jan. 13.—Material reductions in the wholesale price of staple woolen goods for the fall of 1914 were announced in the trade today. The cut is understood to be a direct result of the new tariff schedules and anticipated competition from abroad.

Prices of serges, clays, unfinished worsted and French blacks are from 20 to 37 cents below last fall. Clays show reductions of 20 to 27 cents. Unfinished worsteds are 22 to 26 lower. The heaviest reduction, nearly 23 per cent, is on Washington serge.

Whether the ultimate consumer will reap any benefit from the reductions is a matter of conjecture.

BERNHARDT IS NOW IN LEGION OF HONOR

New York, N. Y., Jan. 13.—From Paris comes the news that at last the name of Sarah Bernhardt has been added to the roll of fame of the Legion of Honor. Her claims have been put forward several times but the influence of a strong element in French society prevented the French actress from obtaining the decoration.

Among the famous women are possessors of the red ribbon are Adeline Pattil, Mme. Curie, Baroness de Rothschild, Mme. Paquin and Mme. Dutrieu, the aviator.

EXHIBITION OF JEWISH ART OPENS

New York, N. Y., Jan. 13.—An exhibition of Jewish art, the first of its kind ever held in America, was opened yesterday in the Concert hall of Madison Square Garden, and will be continued until next Saturday.

There are oriental rugs, silver work in silver and gold, hand-made work in copper and brass, work carving and inlaid work, all produced by the Bezalel School of Handicrafts of Jerusalem.

Professor Bris Schatz, a Bulgarian sculptor, established the Bezalel school eight years ago, on \$15000 capital. He has secured an annual output amounting to nearly \$100,000.

SWINDLES POSTAL SAVINGS BANK

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 13.—What is believed to have been the first case of successful swindling of the postal savings bank through forgery came to light with the announcement of the arrest of Philipp Nurgent alias Jack D. Lynch at Phoenix, Ariz., yesterday.

Nurgent is accused of forging the name of Covad Morris and obtaining \$20 deposited by him in the Omaha postal bank.
