PROGRESSIVES STATE POSITION

New York, N. Y., March 17.—The position of the New York State Progressives, in opposition to any coalition with the Republicans, is expressed in a letter signed by George W. Perkins, and made public today by the Progressive state committee. Mr. Perkins addressed the letter to Professor Frederick M. Davenport of Hamilton college.

Accompanying the letter is another signed by O. B. Phillips, who is acting state chairman during the absence of Theodore Douglas Robinson. Mr. Phillips says:

"This puts at rest all uncertainty as to our stand as to giving up the fight as a Progressive party."

Speaking of what he terms, "the efforts of the Republicans to work up some sort of a scheme by which there would be harmony between the Republicans and the Progressives, this fall," Mr. Perkins says:

"Every day, it seems to me, makes it more and more plain that we are in for a knockdown and drag out fight all along the line. Republican leaders fail entirely to recognize the tremendous changes that have come about in the thoughts of the people, as a result of the mighty evolution that has been under way in recent years, and there is no more chance of their old leaders or old principles ever again being acceptable to our people, than there is for a snowball to survive in Hades."

"Whenever you see any inclination to trade or deal or sympathize with the Republicans, I hope you will swat it, and let us know down here, so that we can hit it again where you hit it before."

Strong Sentiment Against Fusion.
 Huron, S. D., March 17.—A strong sentiment against fusion with any political party or a compromise of party principles was expressed at the opening session of the conference of state Progressives here today. O. K. Davis, chairman of the national committee, in introducing Gifford Pinchot, the principal speaker, announced that the purpose of today's conference was merely to select the provisional state committee, preliminary to the calling of a state conference at which a permanent committee would be appointed and a state ticket selected.

Sentiment also favored Colonel Roosevelt for the national standard bearer of the party.

REPORT CREATES A SENSATION

Sacramento, Cal., March 17.—In a remarkable report communicated to the war department in Washington, Adjutant General Forbes of the National Guard of California, has given official cognizance to an alleged plan of "General" Kelley's unemployed army to seize the federal arsenal at Rock Island, Ill., in order to equip an army of 500,000 men with arms and ammunition for a revolution against the government.

General Forbes' report is based upon one made to him by Lieutenant Franklin Grimes of a Sacramento company of the state guard, who joined Kelley's army as a hobo some days ago, while acting as a spy on behalf of his chief.

Lieutenant Grimes, with a wealth of detail, related how he had gained the confidence of the leaders of the unemployed, who divulged to him their plans for capturing the United States government. There was to be a gathering of many armies at Chicago, according to Grimes, the men reaching that city as best they might. The leaders, according to the militia spy, believed they could assemble 500,000 men at Chicago. Then, moving in force, they would attack and capture Rock Island arsenal.

Wood Commander Railroads, who was commandered, said the lieutenant, and the unemployed force, well armed, would be rushed toward Washington, where it would at once have the federal government at its mercy.

There would then spread a nationwide rebellion of working men against employers of labor, which would depose all civil and military authorities and install the army's leaders as su-

VILLA MOVING ON TORREON

Juarez, Mexico, March 17.—Authoritative announcement was made here this afternoon that General Villa had left Chihuahua before dawn today, moving south toward Torreon.

The news of Villa's departure was taken as indicating that the assault on Torreon would begin at once.

WALL OF CLUB BUILDING FALLS

St. Louis, Mo., March 17.—About a dozen persons were caught under the west wall of the Missouri Athletic club building which was destroyed by fire a week ago, when it was blown over this afternoon and fell on the roof of a four-story building occupied by the St. Louis Seed company.

NEW PEACE PLAN IS SUGGESTED

Washington, March 17.—A conference of representatives of the warring Mexican factions in Washington, under the auspices of the United States, was proposed in a resolution today by Representative Bartholdt, Republican of Missouri, one of the international peace leaders in congress.

Mr. Bartholdt's resolution requests the president to invite representatives of the Huerta government, the Constitutionalists and other revolutionary leaders, to meet here at as early a date as is practicable.
