WALTER GARNER KILLED AND J. FRANK RUSSELL IS INJURED

Young Men Were Riding a Motorcycle, en Route Home From Salt Lake When They Ran at Top Speed Into an Automobile—Both Suffer Crushed Legs and Garner Dies at St. Marks' Hospital in Salt Lake.

Walter Garner, a member of the Garner Brothers' company, 3100 Washington avenue, is dead, and J. Frank Russell, son of Patrolman John Russell, is confined in St. Marks' hospital in Salt Lake City, as the result of an accident which occurred about 6:30 p. m. yesterday.

The two young men were returning from Salt Lake City early last evening on a motorcycle, when, at a point in the road near Bountiful, they endeavored to pass a wagon that was also proceeding toward Ogden. At the time the boys turned out to go by the wagon, an automobile driven by R. C. Watkins of South Bountiful, reached the same point coming from the north and the motorcyclists crashed at top speed directly into it. The impact threw both boys to the ground in front of the auto and they were knocked unconscious.

As quickly as possible, the automobile was stopped and the victims of the accident picked up and taken to a nearby house, Dr. J. L. Woodruff of Bountiful was called and examined the injured, giving them all the attention possible. He found that the legs of both had been badly crushed, evidently by the fender of the automobile and that they had received a number of bad bruises.

In the meantime, the Salt Lake authorities were notified of the accident and the police ambulance was rushed to the scene, with several officers. The boys were placed on stretchers and taken to St. Marks' hospital, where Garner passed away about 9 o'clock this morning.

Two brothers of the dead boy went to Salt Lake early this morning and were expected to return with the body at 4 o'clock this afternoon, which will be taken to the Lindquist mortuary to await the funeral arrangements.

Patrolman Russell also went to Salt Lake and word received from him concerning the condition of his son, was to the effect that the young man was doing as well as could be expected, though his injuries are considered serious, it being feared that the crushed leg may have to be amputated above the knee.

Walter Garner, the dead man, was

a son of Philip Garner of Birch Creek. He was 23 years of age and had passed his life in Ogden. He graduated from the Weber academy in 1910 and for the past two or three years had been in the grocery and meat business with his brother. He was well and popularly known and the news of his sudden death cast a feeling of gloom over the young people with whom he was associated.
