BALL OF FIRE ENTERS A HOME DURING AN ELECTRIC STORM

A heavy thunder storm passed over Plain City between 9 and 12 o'clock last night, and, with one of the brilliant flashes of lightning, a star or ball of green light entered the home of William Mathers, accompanied by an ear-splitting, sharp report. The whole house was shaken and Mr. Mathers, who has had a wide experience as a navigator at sea and who has been in many storms, says he never experienced a more severe electrical disturbance. He and his niece witnessed the ball of fire enter the home, where all the blinds were drawn, and both were almost blinded with the flash. They expected to find the house damaged, but this morning there was no evidence of an electric bolt having struck the place.

BOYS IN STOLEN AUTO PURSUED

Early this morning, E. Knudsen of 181 Patterson avenue, reported to the police department that his automobile had been stolen from the rear of his residence. A short time later, William Richardson, an ex-police officer, informed the police that he had seen three boys in the act of stealing the Knudsen automobile last night. He left the auto standing where it had been deserted and reported the matter to the department this morning.

MUNITIONS OF WAR LANDED

Vera Cruz, Mexico, June 5.—Arms and ammunition for the constitutionalists were disembarked yesterday at Tampico from the American ship Sunshine, commanded by Captain Brown, who carried out the operation without opposition. The papers of the Sunshine which came from Galveston were not deposited at the consulate, the captain declaring he knew no reason why they should be.

SENATORS IN A QUANDARY

Arbitration Amendment to Repeal Bill to Be Voted on Ahead of Original Measure

Passage of Bill and Amendment Later Is Urged by Administration Supporters.

Washington, D. C., June 5.—Another complication faced the senate today in the Panama canal tolls exemption dispute when Senator Sutherland introduced an amendment to the repeal bill his resolution to arbitration. The Sutherland resolution was approved by the foreign relations committee several days ago, but had no right of way before the senate. Its appearance as an amendment means that it must be voted on before the bill itself.

President Wilson is understood to have expressed unwillingness to arbitrate before the repeal is passed and many senators who are standing with the president, but who favor arbitration, are in a quandary.

BESSIE LEROY FAILS TO APPEAR IN COURT

In the municipal court this morning, the case of Bessie LeRoy, which was taken under advisement Wednesday, was again called, but the defendant was not present. After the previous hearing, she had been released on payment of \$10 bail and this was declared forfeited. She was charged with selling liquor without a license.

W. J. Rodgers, the Logan youth whose case was also taken under advisement Wednesday, was released on a 180-day suspended sentence.

Ed Fitzgerald and E. J. Diamond, drunks, were given five-day suspended sentences.

WALL STREET.

New York, June 5.—The market closed easy. Today's fluctuations were narrow and meaningless apart from concerted movements in minor specialties. Selling was resumed in the later dealings.

Room traders put out stock because of the sluggishness of United States Steel and the engagement of \$2,000,000 more gold for export.

Westinghouse fell 1 1/2 on account of the strike of the company's employees.

Quotations eased off slowly in the early transactions in stocks today.

Trading was again light, and the board room operators took no decided position on either side. The chief influence in bringing about the scaling down of market values was a decline in American stocks abroad.

Lacking initiative of its own, the home market followed the lead of London, New Haven and Canadian Pacific lost nearly a point each. Wells-Fargo added two points to its recent gain.

CHICAGO GRAIN

Chicago, June 5.—Although the wheat market showed some firmness at the outset, prices later were inclined to sag. Reports of delayed seeding in Argentina with prospects of a smaller acreage there led to considerably buying, but the favorable weather in the domestic winter belt gradually assumed greater influence. Besides, the Ohio state report was bearish and a sharp decline was reported at Budapest. Quotations which started 1-8c off to 1-8@1-4c up, hardened a little and then fell below last night's level all around.

Higher cables gave corn a temporary lift. Weakness ensued, however, when wheat turned down grade. After opening a shade to 1-4@3-8c up, and scoring a slight further gain, all of the advance was lost and a little more.

Welcome rains eased the oats market. Commission houses generally took to the selling side. Notwithstanding a rise in the hog market, provisions suffered a setback. Speculative offerings were on a liberal scale. Subsequently, export sales at Duluth tended to cause a rally in wheat. The effect however, failed to last. The close was easy at the same as last night to 1-8@1-4c lower.
