

HE WANTS TO TAKE A SHOT AT A LIVE GERMAN

The case which most interested the justice court attendants and the crowd that filled the "gallery" to its capacity this morning was that of the City vs. E. Schneider. Schneider was arrested Saturday night on the charge of drunkenness. He pleaded guilty, to a small degree, saying that he only had 65 cents Saturday night and had purchased a "brewery" could not have purchased a "brewery" he said that someone had "grabbed" him roughly and almost broken his "looking glass." The judge asked him what he wanted with a "looking glass" and he drew a big laugh from the jury in the courtroom when he displayed a pair of spectacles and said, "To look with."

He said further that he was an Alsatian and wanted to get back to his country to take up arms against Germany, because, he said, "I've got something to settle with this Kaiser." He was asked what he had to do with the Germans and he answered that his brother was killed by the Germans about two weeks ago, while crossing the border line.

The judge continued to let him talk and he said that he was 52 years old, had served with the French army long and faithfully enough to receive four medals, and had also served through the Boer war. He was still able to handle a gun, he said, and all he wanted was a chance to get at the Germans. He exhibited a letter from the French consul at San Francisco, in which he was asked if he would like to volunteer for service. He had answered the letter in the affirmative and his sister and brother-in-law, in Alsace were to send him the money to get to France.

During the course of his address, Schneider said all he wanted was to help his fellow members of the working class and, throwing open his coat, showed that all he had under it was an undershirt. He gave his shirt to Mike Miller, a fellow prisoner. Last night, because Miller needed it, Miller was also on the "mourner's bench" and was wearing the shirt.

He told of several events in his past life that kept the listeners in close attention and, when the judge suspended sentence, thanked him and promised to mail him a postcard from France, if he got there.

Mike Miller, whose case on the charge of disturbing the peace was taken under advisement, Saturday, was given a suspended sentence. He evidenced his pleasure by running out of the courtroom.

Federal, State and City Governments Begin Searching Investigation Into Present High Prices.

Chicago, Aug. 17.—Searching inquiry into the present high prices of foodstuffs was begun here today by officials of the federal, state and city governments. Prosecution of firms or individuals held responsible for the recent advance in prices was planned.

James H. Wilkerson, United States district attorney, was prepared to serve subpoenas on men wanted to testify before the federal grand jury. The district attorney said he would prosecute heads of establishments or others whom he found violating the anti-trust act by combination or concerted action intended to control or advance prices.

Legislation providing for the punishment of dealers who make the European war an excuse for advancing food prices beyond reason was to be considered at a special meeting of the municipal market commission. Housewives, representatives of numerous women's clubs, city, state and county officials and officials of the federal government were invited to participate in the meeting.

Sullivan, secretary of the American Olympic committee. Yesterday a cable message, which caused Mr. Sullivan to issue his statement, stated that a prominent English sportsman had suggested that Sweden undertake the task if Germany is still at war in 1916.

ANXIOUS TIMES IN MEXICO CITY

Foreign Population Cut Off From Outside World—Feds Threaten to Make Trouble.

President Wilson's Special Envoy in Mexican Capital to Continue Work.

Mexico City, Aug. 16.—The foreign population spent an anxious night, due to their inability to communicate with the outside world. The federals cut the overland cable connection between Mexico City and Vera Cruz late yesterday, but it was restored this morning.

Five thousand federalists, who were permitted to retire to Guadalupe, with their arms, issued a manifesto today declaring they would start a new revolution, but the constitutionalists immediately published assurances that they were able to control the situation.

General Alvaro Obregon, now commanding the troops in the capital, has posted notices that any officer, soldier or civilian guilty of a crime or disturbing the peace shall be put to death without trial.
