WHAT EUROPE PAYS FIGHTERS.

The Russian soldier is the most poorly paid in all the world. A private in the ranks of the army of the czar gets \$3.78 a year, compared to \$180 to \$200 the United States pays its men of the ranks. England pays its privates \$86.15 a year; France, \$20.40; Germany \$18.80; Austria, \$8.12. Remember, these figures are for a whole year and represent the total amount of cash paid the fighting men in that period.

A Russian major general gets only \$762 a year, or about as much as the United States pays its sergeant majors—the highest non-commissioned rank. Our major generals get \$8,900 a year. The other countries are much more generous with officers of high rank and pay a minimum of about half the United States standard.

A better example of the Russian contrast is shown in what is paid an officer holding the title of general over there. A Russian general gets \$13,272. The United States pays its second lieutenants, young fellows just out of West Point, \$1,700 a year.

ALASKA'S BRIGHT FUTURE. If any added evidence of the efficiency of publicity were necessary it is apparent in the increased public interest in every phase of Alaskan information and in a more practical way, in the swelling tide of travel to the north. The northern steamship lines are carrying capacity loads of travelers, and those who desire to go are required to make their reservations far in advance.

Many of the northern travelers are far-seeing citizens who are getting in "on the ground floor" of Alaska's rejuvenation before the proposed line of the government railway is definitely settled. For these, Fairbanks is the goal, and from this point new town sites are likely to spring up southward.

While there are many men of mature years among the throng of travelers, it is evident that the new Alaska is to be a young man's country. The golden north looks particularly bright to the young men who have the physical strength and the red-blooded optimism to withstand the rigors and meet the trying demands of the pioneer life. And they are not all gold hunters by any means. Trades and profession are well represented among the arizonauts, as well as all branches of commercial life. The existing Alaska towns on the lines of travel are already showing new life under the stimulus of the season's travel.

There is preparation everywhere for a big year in 1915 in Alaska, and there will be no disappointments. Steamship companies are planning for increase of transportation facilities, and plans of new townsites are in the making. Next season will witness a revival of Alaska travel that will bring

suggestions of the 1898 rush of gold hunters, and the human tide will swell larger and larger each succeeding year.

Seattle has reason to rejoice in Alaska's brightening skies. It is bound to the north by ties of personal and commercial interest, and the well or woe of the one will be reflected in the other. The decks are being cleared for General Prosperity.—Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

DIET AND DIGESTION.

Isn't it strange that men who are level-headed in their vocations should be so ignorant, and should do such foolish things in the matter of their health? Take brain workers, for example. They usually do not give their digestive organs half a chance to do their work. Many of them do not know that the digestive act is so tremendously important that nature has supplied the alimentary tract with blood vessels of sufficient capacity to contain more than twice the amount of blood in the entire body. But it is thus she tries to show us the great importance of putting the greatest possible blood supply along the alimentary tract during the digestive processes, which is impossible when one is holding much of the blood in the brain by attempting to do brain work at the same time that the digestive process is going on. Many intelligent people do not know that the reason for being so sleepy and dull after a hearty meal is because nature has sent just as much blood as possible to the digestive organs, and the brain is left without stimulation. Nature thus makes it difficult for us to work right after a meal by withdrawing from the brain the blood which supplies the thinking force. It is positively wicked to attempt to think right after a hearty meal, and no one can persist in doing so without serious results, as he will be defying one of nature's most important laws.—Orson Swett Marden in Nautlius.
