HOW TO MAKE OYSTER STEW

Fannie Merritt Farmer, cookery editor of the Woman's Home Companion presents a number of "Recipes for October" in the October issue of that publication. Among them is her recipe for Boston oyster stew which follows:—
"Put one quart of oysters in a colander and pour over three-fourths cupful of cold water. Carefully pick over oysters, remove tough muscles from half of them, and slightly chop remaining half with removed tough muscles. Add chopped oysters to water drained through colander, heat to the boiling point and let simmer three minutes. Strain through a double thickness of cheesecloth, add reserved soft part of oysters, and cook until oysters are plump. Remove oysters with a skimmer, and put in a tureen with one-fourth cupful of butter, one-half tablespoonful of salt, and one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper. Add oyster liquor strained a second time and one quart of scalded milk. Always remember to scald milk in a double boiler, which overcomes the danger of scorching. Serve with oyster crackers."



WAR SITUATION IN GALICIA

Natural Defenses Make the Russian Armies' Position a Strong One.

AUSTRIANS SEEK REFUGE

Great Enthusiasm Prevails Throughout Russia—All Classes Doing Utmost to Help.

London, Sept. 17, 8:45 a. m.—A dispatch from Petrograd to the Reuters Telegram company gives this outline by the Russians, is 18 miles west of the situation in Galicia:

"The position of Grodek, occupied by the Russians, is 18 miles west of Lemberg and is situated on the heights under which a chain of six almost connecting lakes stretch out towards the Russian frontier, forming a natural defense for 14 miles running north and south. The Austrians abandoned this position after the capture of Lemberg.

"Moskica, to which the Russians have advanced, is a little over forty miles west of Lemberg, on the main line between Przemysl and Lemberg. The shattered Second Austrian army was evidently incapable of staying the Russian advance and took refuge in Przemysl from which the Russians, according to the latest official report, are only 19 miles away.

"Great enthusiasm continues to prevail throughout Russia and all classes are doing their utmost to help in the present emergency. At Moscow the barbers' guild have offered to shave and cut the hair of soldiers free of charge, while at Vilna fifteen cab drivers have offered their services for the transport of the wounded.

JAP WARSHIP IS SUNK BY A MINE

San Francisco, Sept. 16.—Dr. J. Ahrends, German consular secretary at Shanghai, who has just arrived here, declares that four days before the expiration of Japan's ultimatum to Germany the Congo, the largest dreadnought of the Japanese fleet, struck a mine at the entrance to Tsing Tao bay and was blown up. Dr. Ahrends states the Tokio government is not giving out information on the subject, but has announced that the Congo is somewhere between Japan and Honolulu.

KAISER IS BLAMED AS CAUSE OF WAR

London, Sept. 16, 7:40 p. m.—The foreign office issued this evening, in the form of a white paper, the report of Mr. M. von Bunsen, late British ambassador at Vienna, on the rupture of diplomatic relations with Austria, in which the ambassador declares that Austria and Russia had about reached an agreement on the Austro-Serbian dispute when their conversations were cut short by the transfer of the dispute to the more dangerous ground of a direct conflict between Germany and Russia.

The ambassador says that although two days previously he had refused to consent to the continuance of the conversations at St. Petersburg, Count Von Berchtold, the Austro-Hungarian minister of foreign affairs, on July 30, although Russia had been partially mobilized, agreed in a most friendly manner that the conversations should be continued.

"From now onward," says the ambassador, "the tension between Germany and Russia was much greater than between Austria and Russia, as between the latter an arrangement seemed almost in sight, and on August 1 I was informed by Count Schebeko, the Russian ambassador, that Count Szapary, Austrian ambassador at St. Petersburg, had at last conceded the main point of issue by announcing to the Russian foreign minister, M. Sazonoff, that Austria would consent to submit to mediation the points in the note to Serbia which seemed incompatible with the maintenance of Serbian independence.

"M. Sazonoff had accepted this proposal on condition that Austria would refrain from actual invasion of Serbia. Austria, in fact, had fully yielded, and that she herself, at this point, had good hopes of a peaceful issue is shown by the communication made to you on the 1st of August by Count Mensdorff (Austrian ambassador at London), that Austria had neither 'banged the door' on compromise nor cut off the conversations.

"Count Schebeko to the end was working hard for peace. He was employing the most conciliatory language to Count Von Berchtold, and he informed me that the latter, as well as Count Forqach, had responded in the same spirit. Certainly it was too much for Russia to expect that Austria would hold back her armies. But this matter probably could have been settled by negotiations, and Count Schebeko repeatedly told me that he was favorable to the acceptance of any reasonable compromise. Unfortunately these conversations at St. Petersburg and Vienna were cut short

by the transfer of the dispute to the more dangerous ground of a direct conflict between Germany and Russia. "Germany intervened on July 31 by means of her double ultimatum to St. Petersburg and Paris. These ultimatums were of a kind to which only one reply was possible, and Germany declared war on Russia August 1 and on France August 3.

"A few days' delay might in all probability have saved Europe from one of the greatest calamities in history." The ambassador then refers to the rupture of diplomatic relations between Austria and the allied powers, the details of which have already been published.

100,000 AMERICANS CAUGHT IN WAR ZONE

London, Sept. 16, 2:20 p. m.—Henry S. Breckinridge, the American assistant secretary of war, arrived in London today from Havre by way of Weymouth on the American cruiser Tennessee. The cruiser brought no American refugees as practically all who desire to leave France had already done so.

Mr. Breckinridge expects to remain here only a few days before leaving for the United States. He says that his original estimate of 100,000 Americans in Europe wishing to get away when the war broke out has been verified by those engaged in relief work, for reports show that about that number had been assisted or are in process of being aided in some way to leave Europe.

Mr. Breckinridge believes that the \$7,500,000 set aside for the relief of Americans in Europe will suffice, as he thinks their government ought not to be expected to care for Americans who remain in the war zone after being duly warned and given an opportunity to leave at the expense of the government.

In France alone, chiefly in the neighborhood of Paris, it is estimated that 40,000 Germans and Austrians are interned. The American officers make frequent visits to the school and other public buildings where they are held and talk with the prisoners, inspect the sanitary conditions, examine the food served and generally look after the well-being of these foreigners. American officers are performing similar duties on behalf of interned belligerents of other countries involved in the war.

At Berlin, American Ambassador James W. Gerard adopted the plan of treating all Latin-Americans as though they were citizens of the United States. Mr. Breckinridge says that the ambassador's plan is so admirable that it is suggested that it be followed by all American diplomatic and consular representatives, and for weeks citizens of Central America and South America have enjoyed equal attention with Americans from the United States.

The situation in Italy is now comfortable. There are more accommodations on the steamers sailing from Genoa than are demanded.

GERMANS DECLARE COUNTER ATTACKS ARE SUCCESSFUL

London, Sept. 17, 3:55 a. m.—Reuters' Berlin correspondent sends, by way of Amsterdam, the following official German communication from headquarters Wednesday evening:

"The situation on the west has not changed since yesterday." "During Tuesday night and Wednesday the French attacked at several places, but were repulsed. Some German counter attacks were successful.

In the destruction of the cruiser Hela one man was killed and three are missing."

unlimited supplies of ammunition. The Russian divisions are considerably stronger than the Austrian, especially as regards artillery.

Austrian soldiers declare that for every ten Russians killed twenty came in their places. The Russian artillery fire, they said, was wonderfully good but the infantry work was of an inferior kind.

It is anticipated here that there will be a temporary lull in the fighting as both sides are apparently exhausted. The Viennese journals of Tuesday are entirely without news of any Austrian fighting.

Many Wounded Arrive. The wounded continue to arrive in Vienna in great numbers. Eight thousand were brought in on Sunday alone. The hospitals and the various public buildings converted into temporary nursing homes are terribly crowded. Ten thousand wounded are being cared for in the rotunda of the exhibition building in the Prater, the imperial park. Sunday afternoon 30,000 persons visiting the soldiers in the general hospital.
