Decorations for Heroes OF THE EUROPEAN WAR At the close of the present conflict in Europe its heroes will receive from their countries decorations and crosses honoring them for their valor and bravery. Soldiers of whatever rank who have displayed great heroism are almost invariably distinguished in this way. Russia's Victoria Cross, France's Military Medal, Prussia's Iron Cross and Russia's Cross of St. George are all worn by those who, in fighting for their country, have done especially noble things. In France the Military Medal is most commonly awarded the soldier in the ranks who has shown unusual heroism. It is seldom won by an officer, but is none the less regarded by Frenchmen as a greater honor than the Cross of the Legion of Honor. In Germany the Iron Cross has been an institution since the War of Liberation in 1813. It is a Maltese cross of iron, silver-edged and bearing the initial W. for the present emperor, replacing the old F. W. for Frederick William. The recent bestowal of it upon the crown prince by the Kaiser was the first occasion of the sort since 1871. Duke Albrecht of Wurtemberg was also recently so honored.
