"O yess, I been retreatin' with the others all the wye from Belgium; we 'ad a bit of a mix-up around Mons wye, an' I seen the Irish Guards out to bits in Viviers; Woods, My chum took by the Prussians at a place I think they call it Cateau. They took the briches off him, an'—"

Just in the middle of this thrilling story another soldier came up. "I s'ye," he said respectfully, "we ain't got no news down here whatever. Could you tell me, sir—do you know whether the Russians has entered Berlin?"

"Garn!" responded the other in great disgust. "Why, they 'ave't even crossed the Pyrenees yet!"

"What's the name of this place?" I asked. "I don't rightly know, sir," answered Tommy. "We ain't been here but a week. It takes a time to learn 'ow to s'ye it. These Frenchie nymes is all alike."
