Diamonds of the First Water, Polished by the Divine Hand.

The World of Mankind the Mine. Rough Diamonds in the Miry Clay. Washed in Blood Most Precious. Cut on the Wheel of Discipline—Polished by a Famous Lapidarist—Reflecting and Refracting the Light of Truth—Set in a Royal Diadem.



PASTOR RUSSELL

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 31.—Pastor Russell is here We report one of his addresses from the text "They shall be Mine, saith the Lord of Hosts, in that Day when I make up My jewels."—Malachi 3:17.

The figures of speech throughout the Scriptures are full of significance, said the Pastor. When the Lord likens His faithful people to precious stones, it signifies that there is an intrinsic value or beauty that He appreciates, and it implies that such characters are rare, in comparison to the world.

Our text points to the close of the Age in which we live, and not only tells that the Lord will not gather His jewels sooner, but that they are the only ones to be gathered then—He comes to make up His jewels. We have here a contradiction of the ordinary thought on this subject: (1) That He has been gathering His jewels for the past six thousand years; and (2) That everybody who is respectable is to be gathered to the Lord and share in His Kingdom. Evidently this thought is erroneous.

Jewels require to be searched after, and generally need to be washed from the mire before being prepared to reflect the light. So some of the Lord's jewels are found in the ordinary walks of life, and some come from deep down in the mire of sin. By one class of His servants He lifts them out of the horrible pit and the miry clay, washes them, cleanses them from sin through the merit of His own precious blood and through His Word. Then, through other servants and providences He polishes them with Divine skill. In order that they may reflect and refract the light of the glory of the Divine character.—Isaiah 62:3.

The Work of the Great Lapidarist.

The Pastor went on to explain that as the diamond in its rough state—uncut, unpolished—has no more value than a common stone, so those whom the Lord is selecting and preparing as His jewels are to derive their ultimate value from the cutting, shaping, polishing, of their characters under Divine providence. FARMERS BLAMED FOR HIGH PRICES

"Holding Out" Tactics Cause of the High Cost of Living.

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 1.—The "holding out" tactics of American farmers was blamed for the high cost of living by Frank B. Connolly of San Francisco, Cal., president of the National Association of Retail Grocers in an address here last night. The government should cease its investigation of grocers and turn its attention to farmers instead, he said. "Millers are offering \$1.40 a bushel for wheat and are able to get very little of it," he continued, "although the farmers' granaries and elevators are bulging with vast supplies."

"The farmer is the government's pet. He was the first to be exempted from the new Clayton anti-trust bill and it would be impossible to punish him under the anti-trust laws, if it should be proven that there is an agreement to hold wheat."

The company for several days has been feeding its former employees twice a day and the news of the free meals soon spread among the unemployed men now in the city. FREE MEALS DRAW A GREAT CROWD

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—President Wilson will deliver before the chambers of commerce of the United States convention here Wednesday night what his advisers say will be one of the most important speeches of his administration. He is expected to discuss the administering shipping bill now pending in congress, the forthcoming meeting of financial experts of South and Central America in the United States to consider trade relations in the western hemisphere and other steps proposed to assist American foreign commerce.

Secretaries McAdoo and Garrison also are to discuss the shipping bill at the convention from the standpoint of the administration. Senator Burton of Ohio will give the viewpoint of the Republican opposition in congress.

Secretary Bryan will speak on "American Investments Abroad." Other notable men will speak.
