JESUITS TO CONDUCT A MISSION AT ST. JOSEPH'S

Beginning at 10:30 Sunday morning, Rev. Thomas A. Meagher and Rev. Patrick J. O'Reilly will conduct a two weeks' mission at St. Joseph's church. These priests are members of the Jesuit Order which was organized by Ignatius Loyola in 1578. This order made itself prominent in the early history of America by its missionary work among the Indians. A noted Protestant writer says of them:

"The Jesuits have a brave chapter in the French occupancy. Their labors and sufferings and voyages, their fealty to what they thought to be the cause of God make us proud of them, as if they had been our fellow citizens."

Fathers Marquette, Joliet and Hennepin are perhaps the best known of these missionaries and the important discoveries and explorations made by them are well known to every American.

Recognizing that the most effective means of teaching Christianity is by educating the people, the Jesuits, immediately after their organization, began to establish schools and in 1710 had about 600 colleges, 150 normal schools and 25 universities. Bacon said:

"Take example by the schools of the Jesuits, for better do not exist." Since every member of this order becomes a competent teacher, these priests make it their business to devote a part of the time of each mission to explaining the doctrines of the Catholic church. This phase of the work will be taken up the second week beginning March 21.

The fact that this mission is to be given in Father Cushman's church guarantees a welcome to everyone. The order of exercises is as follows: 6 a. m., mass and instruction. 8 a. m., mass and sermon. 4 p. m., stations of the cross, first week. 4 p. m., children's mission, second week. 7 p. m., special instruction for adults, preparing for first communion, and, for non-Catholics seeking information, in hall down stairs. 7:30 p. m., rosary, mission sermon, benediction.


