UTAH PLAYERS DEFEAT CHINESE

Salt Lake Wins Over All Stars in Sensational Finish in Ninth Inning.

San Jose, Cal., March 14.—On a perfect day and before a record-breaking crowd, the Salt Lake players defeated the All Chinese Stars in a sensational finish in the ninth inning this afternoon at Luna ball park. The Salt Lakers came up to bat the last half of the ninth inning, with the score a tie, 2 to 2. Gleason up, fly to center (one out), Barbour up, singles, Lynn up, one-two-three strikes and out (two outs), one man on first, Catcher Hannah batting for Williams up, singles, Shinn singles and brings in winning run.

After the Utahns had scored twice the crowd was all for the Chinese squad. To say that the game was interesting and that there was much enthusiasm would be putting it mildly. The Salt Lake crew made their first run in the second inning. Tennant walks to first, Gedeon hits through second base, Tennant is touched out at home plate. Barbour goes first and Gedeon scores on error. Lynn strikes out. One score made. In the third inning Shortstop Orr stole a hit from Let's bat by making a sensational catch with his bare hand after a long run back.

The Chinese baseballers played inside baseball all the way through. You might say that the team had a very good batting eye. The men were all fast and clever on the bases and they played with the ease of big leaguers, never at any time during the game getting the least bit fussed. This was shown in the fifth inning, when Salt Lake tried to slip one over on them. Barbour was the first man to bat; he knocked a fly and was out. Lynn was then passed on balls and Davis, batting for McCreeery, sacrificed. Shinn doubles and steals third, Gay walks. Two outs, man on first and one on third. Gay tries to steal second. Instead Backstop Mark throws to second, who returns the ball like lightning and Shinn is touched out at home plate. Lynn scored in this inning. The third and last score by the Salt Lakers was made in the last inning. A great deal of commotion was stirred up in the seventh inning when Catcher Lal Tin had to knock Gedeon's legs from under him in order to reach second safely. A double play from Orr to Gedeon to Tennant ended the inning.

The Chinese aggregation made their two runs in the eighth inning. Yap doubles, Let sacrifices, Pitcher Kau singles, scoring Jap. Chin singles and scores Kau. The twirler for the Chinese squad had the boys guessing all the time and McCreeery and Williams allowed the visitors only five hits. McCreeery especially showed up in the box better than he ever did. He says that today is really the first time that his arm really felt good.

Salt Lake Manager Arranges Interesting Slugfest for Tonight at the Manhattan.

Salt Lake, March 14.—Yankee Rue, lightweight champion of Idaho, who meets Young Gilbert, the undefeated local lightweight, in the headliner bout, at the Manhattan club in Salt Lake tonight, is said to be one of the toughest and hardest hitting boys that has ever been brought here by this club. Gilbert has shown that he has a punch equal to any of the boys that have ever appeared here and it should be a great little slugfest from start to finish.

Both boys pronounce themselves in the pink of condition and ready for the bout and confident of the outcome. Rue is not at all boastful, but says if he does not beat the local boy the fans are due for one of the greatest little battles they have ever seen, as he says he is confident that the local boy cannot beat him.

Gilbert is saying nothing, but sawing wood, as usual, and says he will be in there exchanging punches with the Idaho champ from going to ground and is confident that he will be able to land harder and oftener than his opponent.

The boys are to weigh in at the central fire station at 3 o'clock this afternoon, but as they are both natural lightweights, they will not have any trouble about making the weight of 133 pounds.

While this bout is the talk of the fans, they are not overlooking the rest of the card and are much interested in the outcome of the Kid Bobo-Frankie Omstead bout, which will be the semi-windup. These boys are battling on a winner-take-all basis and two judges will be selected by the audience from the ringside to give a hairline decision.

The friends of Frenchie Boyd are anxious to see what he will do against a boy of Jack Meyers' class, as this will be the first time that Frenchie has met a classy boy of his own weight, and as they are not hard-hitting boys, there should be plenty of excitement while it lasts.

Tommy Gethan and Greek George make another pair that are sure to have the fans on their feet from start to finish, as they are both hard hitters for little fellows. Gethan never does any fancy boxing, but walks out to the center of the ring and starts exchanging punches with his opponent. Greek George is somewhat of a comedian as well as a batter and always gives the fans some good laughs, but he is likely to be pretty busy this evening and may not find time to pull any of his funny antics. He is tough and can punch, and it probably will be a case of which one can hit the hardest and fastest while it lasts.

ATTACK ON SUGAR COMPANY A PUZZLE

Salt Lake, March 15.—"I attach no importance, so far as our company is concerned, to the report from Washington that United States District Attorney W. W. Ray has been in conference with the department of justice relative to the activities of the sugar companies in Utah and Idaho," declared T. R. Cutler, general manager of the Utah-Idaho Sugar company, last night.

"Possibly it is a phase of the suit instituted against the American Sugar Refining company, under the Sherman anti-trust act about four years ago," he continued. "That suit has never been entirely settled, although it has been adjusted so far as we are concerned. All the stock in our company is owned by persons not connected with the American company, and I can think of no cause for suit against our company. I believe the attorneys of the various sugar companies interested in the old suit are to appear in New York on March 22 to argue some point in the case."

A report from another source was to the effect that the recent consolidation of the Amalgamated and Lewiston Sugar companies was the basis of the proposed suit. It is said that District Attorney Ray took exception to the consolidation at the time it was proposed, but it is understood that the attorneys representing the sugar companies discussed the matter with the department of justice and obtained its approval before final action was taken.

Mr. Cutler declined to express an opinion regarding the status of the Amalgamated and Lewiston companies, saying that he had been out of the city for some time and was not familiar with the developments.
