GRANT EVANS AGAIN TO ENTER LOCAL ARENA

Grant Evans of Ogden has again broken into the boxing game and will be seen in the headlines bout of the Elite Athletic club's weekly show tomorrow night. His opponent will be Kid Irish of Salt Lake, who put "Mysterious" Jimmy Brown away in one round Monday night and whose record is otherwise too well known among the fans to need reviewing.

Evans obtained a good local reputation as a fighter last year in bouts staged by several Ogden fraternal organizations, but went into retirement through lack of opponents worthy of his mettle. Recently he went into training again, and, since the arrival of Terry Keller in the city, has been working out with the fast light-heavy weight who is to meet Jack Dempsey at the Alhambra theatre next Wednesday night.

The bout between Evans and Irish is scheduled to go six rounds and Matchmaker Eddie Dallas has already been congratulated for securing this duo to top his card.

Boyle of Ogden, who can always be depended on to mix things in lively fashion, has been matched with Harry Schuster of Oakland, for the semi-windup. Both of these boxers won decisions last week and their work appeared to be about on a par. The fans can also look for a fast mill when Boyle and Schuster meet.

Among the featherweights, two promising mixers have been located. They are Young Rivers of Sacramento, a brother of Azevedo, and Slim Duffy of Los Angeles. Rivers has been training with his brother for several weeks and Duffy, who arrived in Ogden, Monday, has been working out at the Elite club.

Young McGee, with two successive victories to his credit this month, will go up against Frankie Richie for four rounds, according to Dallas' dope on Friday night's card. "Char-dope" and Jack Harris have

been booked to amuse the fans with four rounds of boxing, immediately after 8:45 o'clock.

ACOSTA GOES NORTH.
Jose Acosta, who pitched remarkable ball for the Long Branch Cubans last year, has signed with the Vancouver club of the Northwestern league. Acosta last summer scored over the Giants, New Yorks, Reds, Pirates and Browns. Fielder Jones wanted him for the St. Louis Reds, but Jose refused to join that league.

TRACK MEET IS WON BY O. H. S.

The annual Ogden high school-Weber academy track meet was held yesterday afternoon on the high school campus and was won by the high school athletes. Probably the most notable feature of the meet, however, was the performance of Nixon, the academy broad jumper, who jumped 20 feet 1 inch. In the discus throw, which was won by Weber, a high school entrant recorded a throw of over a hundred feet, but lost the glory of victory through stepping out of the ring. The complete score was—Ogden high school 60 6-7 points, Weber academy 31 1-7 points. Owing to the necessity of filling up the Weber relay race team with high school runners, no points were counted in that event.

IDAHO TRACK TEAMS TO COMPETE

Pocatello, Idaho, April 26.—Under the auspices of the Idaho Technical Institute, track teams from every large high school in southern Idaho will be in Pocatello Saturday of this week to compete in the interscholastic competition for various prizes. Owing to the advanced scholastic standing of the Tech men local track men are barred from the meet.

In all there will be 100 men from the schools of the state in the big meet, to be held on College field at the local state school. A. A. U. rules will govern the contests, and only bona fide students of a high school of the state will be admitted to the game.

Prizes for the sprints, distance runs, weights, javelin, discus and all forms of track and field work will be offered by the Idaho Tech to the winners. Several cups for schools and individuals are in the list of prizes, and the competition promises to be keen throughout.

TOM PAINTER REFEREE FOR THE COMING FIGHT

A touch of additional interest was given to the coming Keller-Dempsey ten-round boxing contest last night, when the announcement was made that the boxers had selected Tom Painter of Evanston, Wyo., to referee their bout. Painter is a veteran of the palmy days of boxing in the Intermountain country, with an unquestioned reputation as a referee and as an expert on the fine points of the boxing game.

In the days of the long-route fights between Root and Gardner, Cyclone Johnny Thompson and Pete Sullivan, Young Corbett and Hyland and since, the Evanston man has given entire satisfaction as a referee of big bouts and, in naming him to be the third man in the ring next Wednesday night, Keller and Dempsey have shown that all they desire for themselves and the public is a square deal.

The two Utah huskies are still on the training table. Keller at the Elite Athletic club in Ogden and Dempsey in Salt Lake, and, to the fans who are watching their workouts, appear to be in the pink of condition.

Aside from the main bout Wednesday night, more than ordinary interest is attached to the preliminaries. In the first of these events, Jimmy Johns of Ogden and Harry Atwood of Los Angeles are scheduled to go six rounds, and in the second, Billy Wagner of Chicago will meet Mickey O'Brien of San Francisco. These fighters are credited with having furnished some of the best headline bouts that have yet been staged at the Elite Athletic club in Ogden and the Manhattan club in Salt Lake, with records about even.

INSTRUCTIONS ARE SENT TO SCOTT

Washington, April 27.—Major General Hugh L. Scott, chief of staff of the United States army, who is to confer with General Obregon, Carranza's war minister, regarding the Mexican problem, had instructions today from the Washington government which will guide him in his conference.

"The instructions," says a statement issued by Secretary Baker, are to discuss a basis for the most cordial and complete co-operation between the American and Mexican forces in the attainment of their common object."

SIR ROGER CASEMENT BELIEVED INSANE

London, April 26, 6:26 p. m.—Sir Roger Casement, it is reported, has expressed belief that the uprising in Ireland would be a failure on account of his capture. His leadership, he said, was necessary to the success of the movement.

Several newspapers support the theory advanced by a Conan Doyle a year ago that Sir Roger is insane. The West Minister Gazette advocates that he be disposed of by placing him in a lunatic asylum.
