**SMALL BOY IS

**DR. OSGOOD FUNERAL
TO BE HELD ON
FRIDAY**

With the exception of running
down several theories concerning a
probable motive for the crime, no
new developments in connection with
the murder of Dr. C. F. Osgood by
Heber Burch, Tuesday afternoon were
noted since yesterday. The murder-
er was removed from the city to the
county jail yesterday afternoon, fol-
lowing his arraignment on a charge
of murder in the first degree.

It was found that, in addition to the
brother and sister of Heber Burch
having been sent to the state mental
hospital at Provo in 1912 and 1908,
respectively, his cousin, Eva Velinda
Burch, was committed to that institu-
tion in 1895. Yesterday the murderer
told Detective Robert Burk that he
had carried a gun several times for
the purpose of killing Dr. Osgood.

Another theory now being investi-
gated by the police is that Burch is
the man who forced an entrance to
Dr. Osgood's residence last February,
and then left without taking any-
thing, having apparently broken into
the house to kill the physician.

The funeral of Dr. Osgood will be
held tomorrow at 2:30 p. m. at the
family residence, 2550 Jefferson ave-
nue, under the auspices of the Maso-
nic lodge. The body may be view-
ed at the Kirkendall chapel this after-
noon and at the Masonic temple
tomorrow from 10 a. m. to 12:30
p. m.

POST SENT OUT**

The shipment of a solid carload of
merchandise by parcel post from the
wholesale establishment of the John

**PET BROWN WILL
BE DISAPPOINTED**

J. M. Forwood, manager of Pet
Brown, has expressed a fear that
Jack Harbertson will try to back
down from his scheduled bout with
the Texan, according to the Salt Lake
Telegram. In this regard, Forwood,
who is in Salt Lake with his protegee,
says:

"The one thing that worries us now
is Harbertson. We are both scared
to death that Harbertson will find
some sort of an excuse before Pet
can shake hands with him on the
mat. Something tells me that Har-
bertson will never meet Pet—that he
will have an automobile accident or
some sort of an alibi about the day
before the match. He isn't very an-
xious to meet Pet and would never
have agreed if his Ogden friends and

**BERT GRAY ARRESTED
ON A CHARGE OF
ROBBERY**

Yesterday afternoon Deputy Sheriff
Orin Hadlock arrested Bert Gray,
alleged cherokee, and took him to the
county jail, charging him with grand
larceny. Gray protests his innocence,
but the officer claims to have caught
the fellow in the act.

The officer states that his attention
was called to two men sitting on the
rear steps of a lower Twenty-fifth
street business place, one attempting
to find \$5 which he had suddenly
missed, and the other aiding him.
The one who lost the \$5 was Walter
Borders and his willing assistant was
Gray. A \$1 bill was finally found by
Borders and it was decided that they
have a drink. Borders slipped the
small bill into his vest pocket, but
before the two reached the bar, Gray
had it in his vest pocket, the deputy
sheriff observing the "fleeing pro-
cess."

The drinks were had and Gray
magnanimously threw down the \$1
bill to pay for them. The bartender
handed him the change but Borders
remurred, claiming the money was
his. They began to dispute ever the
change when the deputy sheriff made
himself known and took the two men
to the police station, where Borders
stated that he had been robbed of \$11.
A search of Gray disclosed the
money.

**BOY ARRESTED BY

Richardson is a man about 45 or 50
years of age and he claims to be a

constantly on guard and prepared
every minute to protect himself. He
thinks the man who seeks his life is
somewhere in the padded cell.

In a car of lumber received by the
Volker Lumber company, from Deer
Park, Washington, was a board placed
in the center of the load with this in-
scription:

"I. W. W."

"G—d— your Utah. It will cost
you millions now, when you killed
Joe Hillstrom, you blood thirsty Mor-
mon hypocrites."

Deer Park, the camp from where
the lumber was shipped is in eastern
Washington, near the Idaho line.

The writing was done with an in-
delible pencil, and is supposed to be
the message of one of the gang of
I. W. W. agitators in Utah a year
ago.

Many threatening letters were
written to the governor at the time
Hillstrom was executed and this lat-
est evidence of a revengeful spirit
shows that the Industrial Workers
are slow to forget.

**HEAVY SENTENCE FOR
GREEK WITH A
WEAPON**

That the city authorities are going
to deal severely with men caught with
concealed weapons was evidenced this
morning in the municipal court, when
Judge George S. Barker sentenced
George Pachis, a local Greek, to serve
30 days in jail or to pay a fine of \$30.
Pachis was arrested by Patrolman
William Brown on lower Twenty-fifth
street, Monday afternoon, and it is
said that only quick action on the part
of the officer prevented the Greek
from taking a shot at him.

L. M. Johnson, who was arrested
for interfering with Patrolman Walter
Moore while in the discharge of
his duty, forfeited \$10 bail. Charles

**PLEA MADE FOR
REBEL MASSES**

John Redmond and Sir Ed-
ward H. Carson Ask Len-
iency for Revolutionists.

London, May 4.—The only protest
voiced in parliament yesterday against
the execution of the three leaders of
the Irish revolution came from Laur-
ence Glennel, member of the north
division of Westmoth, who is classed
as a nationalist but is actually an in-
dependent. The three leaders, Pat-
rick H. Pearse, Thomas J. Clark and
Thomas MacDonagh, were shot Wed-
nesday morning after trial by court
martial.

Plea for Leniency.
John Redmond, leader of the Irish
parliamentary party joined with Sir
Edward H. Carson, leader of the Irish
Unionists in a plea for leniency to-
ward the great mass of the revolu-
tionists.

In a speech explaining his resigna-
tion as chief secretary for Ireland,
Birrell confessed that he had mis-
calculated the strength and serious-
ness of the Sinn Fein movement. He
paid a tribute to the Irish race and
said that he hoped good might come
from the grave events at Dublin. "Ir-
ish soldiers," he said, "are still the
best representatives of their country,
fighting as they are in all theaters of
the war."

Mr. Birrell admitted that he had
been urged by a great many persons,
who possibly knew Ireland better than
he did, that it was the duty of the gov-
ernment to suppress the Sinn Feiners
wherever found and take away their
arms, although up to the last moment
no proof had been forthcoming that
they were in hostile association with
the enemy. He asked the house, how-
ever, to consider what the circum-
stances might have been, had such a step
been taken.

**THREE NUNS GIVE
STATE EVIDENCE**

Tell How a Child Was Obtain-
tained From Hospital and
Foisted on an Estate
as Legal.

Chicago, May 4.—Three nuns of
Misericordia hospital, Ottawa, Ont.,
made statements today to Samuel G.
Ramsey, assistant states attorney con-
cerning the circumstances under
which Mrs. Annie Dollie Ledgerwood
Matters is said to have gained pos-
session of a girl she claimed was her
daughter. Mrs. Matters, with Charles
T. Mellon and Harry Edwards, are
on trial charged with conspiracy to
foist a spurious heir on the estate of
Fred Matters.

According to Mr. Ramsey, who re-
fused to give the names of the nuns,
the mother superior told him Mrs.
Matters came to the hospital, said she
had lost her husband and that she
wanted to adopt a boy and raise him
as her own. She took a fancy to a
