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NO TEACHERS ARE NAMED BY BOARD
No executive action was reported from the session of the board of education held last night, the school directors going into private session to consider the employment of teachers for next year, after a brief open meeting.

At the open meeting, a communication from Fred W. Gentsch, superintendent of dining cars and hotels of the Ogden Short Line railroad, was read. It stated that the O. S. L. had recently issued two "Safety First" circulars, copies of which would be furnished the board in any amount desired, for distribution among the school children, on request. The matter was referred to the Board of W. H. Williams with power to act.

City Treasurer Carl Allison reported a number of delinquent curb and gutter taxes now due the city. This matter was referred to the law committee to investigate and report.

Harry Hales, county clerk, submitted a claim for \$14.86 for the refund of taxes. This bill and one for \$3 from the Ogden high school were ordered paid. The high school bill was for expenses of the debate in the northern division contest.

Larkin and George Hill, who stated that the injury of the little girl was entirely accidental and that the child, through momentary bewilderment, got in the way of the motorcycle and was knocked down despite the efforts of Mr. Foulger to avoid an accident.

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
