HANS TAUSCHER IS ACQUITTED

German Not Proven to Be Aware of Purpose of Von Papen and Von der Goltz.

New York, June 30.—Hans Tauscher, former German army officer, was acquitted today by a jury of conspiracy to blow up the Welland canal.

Judge Hand in his charge, instructed the jurors that if they found that Tauscher knowing furnished the dynamite, or the pistols, they must find him guilty of conspiracy.

"Testimony which I do not find has been disputed" the court said, "has been adduced to show that von der Goltz sent by and equipped by Captain von Papen, did go to Canada, and finding the canal guarded by soldiers, returned to this country. The only matter of dispute is whether Tauscher was aware of the purpose for which von der Goltz and Captain von Papen wanted the dynamite and the pistols furnished by Tauscher."

PRESIDENT PARDONS IDAHO BANKERS

Washington, June 30.—President Wilson today pardoned S. B. and W. G. Simpson, owners of the First National Bank of Caldwell, Idaho, convicted in March, 1915, and sentenced to five years imprisonment for issuing a certificate of deposit with intent to defraud. The brothers pleaded that no fraud was contemplated and that the loss had been made good. They were granted respite a few days ago and have not served any part of their sentences.

Washington, June 30.—Release of Harlow Hamilton, an American held since 1912 on a charge of murder by Mexican authorities at Oaxaca City was reported today.

WORLD'S MARKETS

New York, June 30.—Renewal of pressure against Mexicans and other high priced specialties accounted for the irregular trend of today's early trading. Mexican Petroleum opened with a loss of a point, this soon being doubled. Industrial Alcohol, one of the unsettling features of the preceding session, was the weakest issue, losing 4 1/2 points on further moderate liquidation. Marines helped stabilize yesterday's final dealings were lower on realizing sales at first but recovered later with Union Pacific, United States Steel and other issues. Elsewhere changes were mainly fractional, but in the direction of higher levels.

Mexican Bonds Drop.

New York, June 30.—A sale of Mexican government four per cent debenture bonds was reported on the stock exchange today at 27 1/2, a decline of 22 1/2 points from the last previous sale in February.

Chicago, June 30.—Higher cable quotations today to strengthen the wheat market here. Opening prices, which ranged from 1.86 1/4 to 1.2c advance with July at 1.01 1/2 to 1.01 3/4 and September at 1.05 1/8 to 1.05 1/2 were followed by slight gains all around and then a moderate reaction.

Favorable weather eased corn. After opening 3-5c down to 1-8c up the market settled on a general sag. Oats weakened with corn. Selling, though, was not of a scattering character.

EXAMINATIONS ARE TO BE HELD

On July 19 an open competitive examination for third-class steam engineers will be held in this city under the direction of the United States civil service commission. From the register of eligibles resulting from this examination certification will be made to fill a vacancy in this position at the Federal building here in Ogden, at \$900 per year.

Competitors will be examined on practical questions in mechanical engineering, including heating apparatus and elevator machinery, and those with training and experience will be given preference in appointments. The examination is open to all citizens of the United States who meet the requirements and are over 20 years of age, but not 50.

Persons who meet the requirements and desire examination should at once apply for form 1371, stating the title of the examination desired, to the secretary of the United States civil board, federal building, Ogden, or to the secretary of the Twelfth civil district, postoffice, San Francisco, Cal.
