

Chicago, Sept. 26.—Boston's lead in the American league appeared more secure today than at any time during the season, as Chicago, closest rival, two and one-half games away, has only four more games to play. In yesterday's double-header with Chicago, Brooklyn was simply able to break even, while Philadelphia moved up a notch by winning from Cincinnati. Boston climbed to within four games of the top by taking a doubleheader from Pittsburgh. Games yet to be played by the three leaders are: Brooklyn, nine; Philadelphia, ten; and Boston, thirteen.

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WORLD SERIES ON OCTOBER 7TH

Race Being Uncertain, Final Arrangements Must Be Delayed, Says Johnson.

Chicago, Sept. 27.—The world's series will open on Saturday, October 7, according to President B. B. Johnson of the American league, who, as a member of the national commission, is today ready to begin preparations for the series. With the race as uncertain as it is, no final action has been taken yet by the national commission, Mr. Johnson said. "I am certain that the world's series will start on October 7," said Johnson. "The contestants might be willing to begin October 6, but I hardly think so. The American league race closes one day earlier than the Nationals, so I do not think that would be fair to the National winner, however, so it looks as if the opening game would be played a week from next Saturday. "Owing to the uncertainty of the race we have been unable to make any arrangements for the series and I don't know whether to start or remain in the west. The White Sox still have a chance, but of course in the National league the winner will be an eastern team."

TRYING TO IDENTIFY VICTIM OF ACCIDENT Provo, Sept. 26.—A letter from E. L. Stanfield, coroner at Barstow, Cal., has been received by Constable Ren Wilkins asking for information of a man who was killed on the railroad September 15 and buried at Barstow. Mr. Stanfield writes that there were no means of identification found on the body, but that after the inquest he had been informed that a note in the man's pocket stated that his name was Newman and that his home was in Provo, Utah. There is no "Newman" in the Provo city directory and so far Mr. Wilkins has been unable to learn of any Newmans living here. Mr. Stanfield describes the dead man as being about 55 years of age, 5 feet in height, weight about 115 pounds, light hair, gray eyes and without teeth. He was poorly dressed and only 5 cents was found in his pocket.
