## ROADS RELEASE GERMAN FAMILY VESSELS TO U. S. FACING TRIAL

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Plans to release for government use many coastwise vessels on both the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard are under way among the chief railroads.

Through the council of national defense the government has requested the roads to re-arrange their schedules and facilities as to permit the release of virtually all vessels in coastwise trade to the government. Many of the ships thus released probably would be used in the transportation of foodstuffs and supplies to the allies pending the construction of the government's fleet of wooden vessels, the first of which will be ready in about five months.

Great Lakes Ships Taken. Steamships operating on the Great Lakes also will be used for the same purpose.

A sizeable fleet for the transatlantic trade, officials believe, could be obtained quickly by taking over the chief coastwise vessels plying out of New York to New England, southern and gulf ports. On the Pacific there are only a few vessels which could be made available for this trade.

Railroad Traffic Problems. The chief problem confronting the railroads in working out the plan is to dispose of the burden of traffic at present carried by the coastwise vessels. The railroads are at present operating almost to the maximum, but through pooling their interests in equipment, hope to evolve a plan under which most of the coastwise traffic can be diverted to rail lines. "To permit the shipping board to operate at its maximum efficiency without the handicap of adequate capital, Democratic leaders in congress are considering a proposal to increase the sum placed at the board's disposal from \$50,000,000 to \$200,000,000. The latter sum, it is thought, will be needed when the wooden ship program is in full operation.

EL PASO, Texas, April 13.—Indictments were returned today in the United States district court against Mrs. Amelia Toennigs, Clarence Toennigs, Josephine Toennigs, her daughter, and Henry, all Germans, charging them with "conspiracy to levy war against the United States by inducing and instigating Mexican military commanders to invade the United States from Mexico."

Mrs. Toennigs and Beach were arrested recently, following a raid by the provost guards on a house in the Mexican section. Later Mrs. Toennigs' son and daughter were taken into custody. Another indictment was returned against Mrs. Toennigs and Beach charging an attempt to prevent United States officers from making an investigation of their cases.

Four Americans Indicted. Indictments also were returned against four Americans and two Mexicans charging conspiracy to ship 200,000 rounds of ammunition from Douglas, Ariz., to Mexico.

The Americans were J. E. Anderson, Bernard Schuster, Arthur Schuster and V. B. Andreas. The Mexicans were Emilio Ortiz and C. H. Arnulfo. The ammunition was alleged to have been sent from Douglas to El Paso and was intended for exportation to Mexico. The men indicted claim they notified the department of justice officials here and received their permission to make the shipment.
